Rev. R. J. Wilson to Spend Three
Months Preparing Way
Among Presbyterians

The task of preparing the Pres-
byterian Church for Union with
the Methodist and Congregational
Churches, to form one United
Church of Canada, has been un-
dertaken by Rev. R. J. Wilson,
D.D., at the request of the Pres-
byterian Church Union Movement
Committee. In order to initiate
this great and inspiring task, Dr.
Wilson has been granted three
months' leave of absence from his
ministry in Chalmers Church,
Kingston.

Dr. Wilson is particularly well
qualified for the work he has
taken in hand. He is a man of
forceful but genial personality,
has rare executive ability, the
gift of oratory, is a ready and
 incisive writer, and has had a
wide experience as a minister and
as a man among men. Before
moving to Kingston in 1918, he
served with striking success for
fifteen years as minister of St.
Andrew's Church, Vancouver. He
has thus a first-hand knowledge
of the Church, East and West.

personality the traditional Pres-
byterian with the native-born
forward-looking Canadian. He
has a warm regard for the "auld
Kirik" of his forefathers, and
when the question of Church
Union was first mooted he was
one of the foremost in opposing
it. Later, however, he caught the
vision of a United Church of
Canada, and he has not been dis-
obedient to that vision.

"There is a thrill in this thing
—can't you feel it?" he said to
me the other day. "I take no sec-
ond place to any man in my love
for the Presbyterian Church, and
if I thought that by Union we
were to lose any of those vital
and vigorous qualities that have
placed Presbyterians in the front
rank of thought and action
throughout the world, I would be
with Dr. Scott and Mr. McBeth
today. But I am too much of a
Presbyterian to be bound by an
idolatrious servitude to the out-
ward forms of tradition, and I am
too much of a Canadian to be
blind to the demands of the pres-
ent day and the vision of the
great future which lies before
this Dominion."

"You seem to be quite sure
that Church Union will be con-
summated," I said.

Is Quite Sure
"I am as sure of that as I am
that the sun will rise tomorrow
morning," the doctor replied em-
phatically. "Can you imagine a
progressive people like Canadians
never changing the form of their
ecclesiastical organizations from
that which was made for an en-
tirely different country and a
different people? Such a static
condition would result in re-
ligious stagnation, and I am not
so sure but that this is what the
churches are suffering from to-
day. Church Union will not usher
in the millennium, and it will not
finally abolish all the differences
in form and creed among Chris-
tians; but, so far as Canada is
concerned, it will be a stupendous
move forward. We believe that
the consummation of this Union
will give an inspiring lead to
Christiandom throughout the
world. Church Union must come,
and will come, despite all these
efforts that are being put for-
ward to stop it. Why, then, should
we of this generation not share
in its benefits? If we as Pres-
byterians do not take this tide of
God at the flood, we shall spend
the rest of our lives in shallows
and miseries."

REPORT OF USK FIRE

Officer Attributes Blame to No
One but Inquest May be
Held

A report on the recent fire at
Usk where the infant child of
Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Scully was
burned to death when their
home was destroyed by flames
has been received at the local
provincial police office from
Constable C. A. Mancoir, of Ter-
race, who has just completed an
investigation of the circum-
stances. While the officer states
his satisfaction that no blame
could be attached to anyone in
connection with the tragedy,
Coroner Stephen H. Hoskins, of
Smithers, has been notified with
a view to holding an inquest be-
fore funeral takes place.

Recounting the circumstances
of the fire, Constable Mancoir
in his report states that Mrs.
Scully had left the house to say
good-bye to a neighbor. She left
the baby in bed with its bottle
and everything appeared to be
safe. Returning in a few min-
utes, she found the small home in
flames. She called for help and
endeavored to get into the bed-
room but was driven back by
smoke and fire. All available
men responded but owing to
shortage of water snow had to be
used and good work was done in
saving adjoining buildings. When
the fire was brought under con-
trol, the baby was found dead
inside with its face and arms
badly burned. Another child,
aged three, which had been in
the kitchen, escaped safely.

The shack had two rooms, one
room used as a bedroom and the
other as a kitchen. The bedroom
was papered and investigation
indicated that the paper had
caught fire either from a spark
from the stove or from an over-
heated stovepipe. Thus it would
have taken only a few minutes
for the whole place to be in
flames.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

Minimum price of first-class and
reduced to \$5 an acre, second-class to
\$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to sur-
veyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only
land suitable for agricultural purposes
and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emption abolished,
but parties of not more than four may
acquire for adjacent pre-emption
with joint residence, but each making
necessary improvements on respective
claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claim for
five years and make improvements to
value of \$10 per acre, including clear-
ing and cultivation of at least one-
acre before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation for
less than 3 years and has made the
portable improvements, he may, be-
cause of ill-health, or other cause, be
granted intermediate certificate of im-
provement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent resi-
dence may be issued, provided appli-
cant makes improvements to extent of
\$250 per annum and records same each
year. Failure to make improvements
or record same may operate as for-
feiture. Title cannot be obtained in
less than 5 years, and improvements
of \$100 per acre, including 5 acres
cleared and cultivated, and residence
of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant
may record another pre-emption, if he
requires land in conjunction with his
farm, without actual occupation, pro-
vided statutory improvements made
and residence maintained on Crown-
granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20
acres, may be leased as homesteads,
title to be obtained after fulfilling resi-
dential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes
areas exceeding 640 acres may be
leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites, on
timber land, exceeding 40 acres may
be purchased; conditions include
payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows, inaccessible
by existing roads, may be purchased
conditional upon construction of a road to
them. Rebate of one-half of cost of
road, not exceeding half of purchase
price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.
The scope of this Act is enlarged to
include all persons joining and serving
with the forces of His Majesty's Forces.
The within which the heirs or devisees
of a deceased pre-emptor may apply
for title under the Act is extended
from one year from the death of
such person, as formerly, until one
year after the conclusion of the great
war. This privilege is also made re-
troactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are
due or payable by holders on pre-
emptions recorded after June 28, 1918.
Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys ac-
crued due and been paid since August
4, 1914, on account of payments, fees
or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements in purchase
town or city lots held by members of
Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired
direct or indirect, remitted from en-
listment to March 31, 1920.

**SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN
LANDS.**
Provision made for issuance of
Crown grants to sub-purchasers of
Crown Lands, acquiring rights from
purchasers who failed to complete
purchase, involving forfeiture, on ful-
fillment of conditions of purchase, in-
terest and taxes. Where sub-purchas-
ers do not claim whole of original par-
cel, purchase price due and taxes may
be distributed proportionately over
whole area. Applications must be made
by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.
Grazing Act, 1913, for systematic
development of livestock industry pro-
vides for grazing districts and range
administration under Commissioner.
Annual grazing permits issued based
on numbers ranged, priority for estab-
lished owners. Stock-owners may
form Associations for range manage-
ment. Free, or partially free, permits
for settlers, campers or travellers, up
to ten head.
