NO DIFFICULTY WITH SMITHERS

Locals Made Practice Game of Baseball Match Yesterday and Won 15 to 2.

The opening game of the Exhibition baseball series yesterday afternoon resulted in a rout for the visitors from Smithers while the home team made little more of it than a practice match. The score was 15 to 2 in favor of Prince Rupert. The boys from the Bulkley Valley were plainly outclassed by the locals especially in the fielding department. The Prince Rupert players connected easily with Les Lane, the Smithers hurler, and what hits they made were placed to good advantage. The visitors batted consistently into the mits of the locals who maintained a good tight field without extending themselves very much. Up to the eighth inning the home team had gathered in 11 runs before the visitors scored at all, pounding them out pretty thick into the left field region. The visitors were probably handicapped to some extent by the fact that they were playing on strange ground and a number of flies were dropped or otherwise fumbled. When the match was easily theirs, the Prince Rupert men were shifted around from one place to another and some men reserved on the bench were put in towards the end for practice purposes. The first score the visitors made in the seventh inning was due to fielding errors on the part of the Prince Rupert men and the second in the ninth walked home because of a passed ball.
