Ocean Bottom Displaced Say Japanese Seismologists who Investigated Recent Quakes

OSAKA, Sept. 12.—Earthquake shocks, which a week ago brought desolation to Japan, were not caused by volcanic disturbances but by violent dropping of two portions of the arth's surface, according to the best seismologists in Japan, who agree that the ocean bottom near Ito and that near the naval base at Yokosuka were successively displaced causing similar disturbances ashore.

No new volcanoes have appeared in spite of persistent reports, the seismologists declare, adding that farm lands in some places in outlying districts of the Bose peninsula are now six feet lower in proportion to sea level and some parts are sub-
