Election Might Strengthen Liberals.

Politically, the Liberal party might gain further strength in the House of Commons by returning to the electors at this time for a mandate on their fiscal policy which is admittedly a popular one.

The budget vote of last week saw one of the closest divisions since the government has been in power but it is doubtful if that division reflected truly the public opinion of the country. The Conservatives might have been expected to oppose the budget especially since there was a live possibility of the government being defeated. However, it is questionable if the stand that many of the Progressives took against the budget would have been endorsed by their individual electorates. Thus it seems reasonable that an appeal to the people on the question would be very timely especially since the situation is getting uncomfortably close for the government politically.

On the face of it, the government has been doing good work and the people are satisfied. Everything would indicate that it would now be endorsed in a larger way than it was given power at the 1921 election. However, with the people satisfied, an election at this time might be undesirable and the government may decide to continue under the present risks. On the other hand, it might be better to have an election now and save the disorganization that would come with a sudden adverse vote.

Canada Improving Industrially And Financially.

Industrially Canada is far from standing still. Many important industrial concerns regard the outlook as materially more promising than it was twelve months ago. Twenty corporations that have published balance sheets recently have shown total net profits of \$12,269,263. This figure is \$1,932,336 over that of the previous year.

Recent banking statements show an increase in loans of \$18,000,000 in the month of March and an increase of \$6,952,260 in saving bank deposits over the corresponding period in 1922.

Outlook For Crops Is Good.

A good crop this year is being looked for by railways and business interests. In anticipation of this money is freer and business is expanding.

The most recent crop reports of both the Bank of Montreal and the Canadian Pacific Railway agree that soil and moisture conditions in the West are satisfactory. Seeding is now well under way in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta. The grain will have had a good start by the time the warm weather comes in spite of the late spring.

The heavier rainfall in central and northern Alberta recently provided moisture where it was needed and will increase the acreage to be seeded in areas affected.

The weather has been warm and dry in British Columbia. Spring opened comparatively early and a good percentage of grain and roots is already sown. Much of this is already up and growing lustily. Present indications in B.C. point to a good crop.

Some Sores To Be Healed, But Menace Still There.

Despatches from London on Saturday indicated that some recent European sore points are about to be negotiated without resort to force which had been feared. The Turk-Greek dispute has been settled and Russia has acceded to British marine demands without the necessity of a show of arms being resorted to. Some long standing Near East disputes also show signs of solution.

The big question that still passively remains a menace to the peace of Europe and which, with some startling development, may cause a general embroilment, however, still remains in about the same position. That is the French occupation of industrial Germany. As long as Germany continues to submit peacefully there will probably be peace but it will be a point of danger until some other means for meeting the French demands are found besides occupation.
