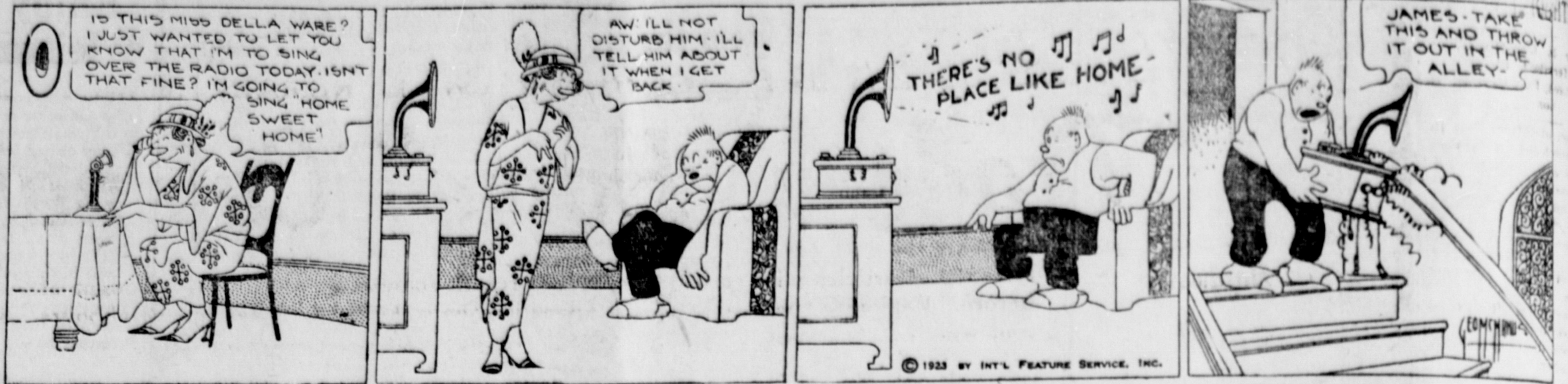

LECTURE WAS INTERESTING

Rev. Dr. John Knox Wright Shows Scene of King Tutankamen's Tomb and Made Explanations

Referring frequently to King Tutankamen and showing magic lantern slides of Egyptian mummies and tombs in the Valley of the Kings where the late Lord Carnarvon last year discovered the remains of the ancient monarch, Rev. Dr. John Knox Wright, secretary for B.C. of the British and Foreign Bible Society, delivered an interesting illustrated lecture on Egypt in the Presbyterian Church on Saturday evening.

Rev. Dr. H. R. Grant presided, and His Grace Archbishop E. H. Du Vernet pronounced the benediction. Mrs. R. A. Harlow presided at the piano. There was a small but very appreciative audience.

Among the slides shown and explained was one showing the exact spot near Luxor, a suburb of the ancient city of Thebes, where Lord Carnarvon discovered the tomb of King Tutankamen after 40 years of searching. Dr. Wright stated that already \$10,000,000 worth of treasure had been taken out of the tombs in this vicinity. Next year when the tomb of King Tutankamen is reopened it is expected that many valuable manuscripts will be discovered giving further light on the ancient history of Egypt. The greatest ruins of the world had been discovered in the Valley of the Kings. A picture of the unwrapped mummy of Rameses II. of the same dynasty as Tutankamen, was shown in the course of the lecture.

Trip Up Nile
 Dr. Wright's lecture took the form of a trip up the Nile from Alexandria to the great Assuan dam, the building of which Dr. Wright said will destroy many great ruins through the overflow. Pictures of the modern cities of Alexandria, Thebes and Memphis and the wonderful ruins including mosques, tombs, the Pyramids and the Sphinx proved highly interesting, the presentation being enhanced by the explanations clearly given by the speaker.

In closing, Dr. Wright made an appeal on behalf of the work of distributing the Bible in Egypt, where was set so much of the early Christian history.

Dr. Grant, in thanking Dr. Wright, endorsed his appeal in connection with the work.

failed of fulfillment. At bat, he is the same "Peach." His eye seems as clear as in his earlier days when he was the bugbear of all pitchers in the league. He continues to meet the ball squarely, and his faculty of driving it out of reach of the fielders seems greater, if anything, this year than ever.

It is a different Cobb who guides the destinies of the 1923 Tigers from the player who flashed among the major league constellations in 1905, gaining in brilliancy and renown until in 1914 he became a 420 batter. The speed that gave Cobb a new major league record for stolen bases in 1915, with a total of 98, is waning, but in its place has come craftiness, and because he has so much speed to lose, he still is a great outfielder, still a dangerous man on the paths. From the start of this season he has had the Tigers among the league leaders. Close followers of the game have seen in Detroit the principal menace to the New York Yankees in this season's race. Cobb's heavy artillery is conceded to be the equal of the New York club's "murderer's row," and his pitching staff, considered the principal weakness of the club, has shown surprisingly well during the first month, the veteran Dauss especially appearing near the peak of his form.
