SCHOOL BOARD WILL CONSIDER MATTER OF SALARIES NEXT MONTH

There will be a special meeting of the school board about the middle of June, on the return of Trustee Casey from Alice Arm, to go into the matter of salary scale revision and appointment of teachers for the following term. At that time reports from Inspector Fraser and Superintendent Campbell on the work of the individual teachers will be considered.

The question of the necessity of giving teachers notice of possible changes in salary schedules so that they might resign before the time set out, June 1, was discussed and the board agreed that teachers would be allowed to resign after that date in view of the board taking up the matter at such a late date. Trustee Parker and Dr. Kergin suggested, however, that any revisions would not be radical and there would be possibly none at all.

Trustee Montgomery spoke in favor of appointing local applicants to vacancies wherever possible. Dr. Kergin replied that this had been the policy of the board in the past. Some resignations are expected.

ALL-RUSSIAN CHURCH MEETS

Convention Supports Soviet Government: Bishop Blake Made Honorary Member

SEATTLE, May 8.—The convention which Bishop Blake of the Methodist Church attended and where he delivered an address to which the other bishops took exception and which occasioned his recall, took place at Moscow. It was a convention of priests, a meeting of ecclesiastics of the Russian orthodox church met to prepare a basis for a new Russian Church. The delegates were members of the "Living Church" section of the Russian Church who are seeking a form of religion that will be acceptable to the rulers of today.

The reorganization is expected to take the form of abolition of bishops, the recognition of the authority of the soviet government, and acceptance of the order under which all church property was nationalized.

Swayed Gathering
According to a report of the gathering hardly was the session under way before Bishop Wedensky—an image of a splendid Mephisto, with his hooked nose and small, pointed beard bristling from the fitting halo of black hood—swayed the gathering in an impassioned speech.

His feminine voice rose and fell softly as he thanked the soviet government for their liberation. He called them "liberators for truth."

"While the bolsheviks are unbelievers, their aim is the same as the church—namely, the welfare of the people," he told the convention, which sat enthralled by the powers of the orator.

"Our church, therefore, must be loyal to the government. We must abandon any counter revolutionary attitude which was formerly exercised under Patriarch Tikhon, whom the government is rightly prosecuting."

So greatly was the congress stirred by his lyrical speech and voice that it did not rebel at his denunciation of the metropolitans who used to be the head of their church, the patriarch of all Russia, now facing trial for opposition to the soviet system.

Address Sent Lenin

So carefully did Bishop Wedensky play upon the minds of the gathering that when he had finished the convention voted enthusiastically to send his address of loyalty to the all-Russian executive and to Premier Lenin, with their blessings. The decision was unanimous.

Bishop Blake likewise was enthusiastically received.

"In the name of the bishops of the Methodist Episcopal church, I salute you as fellow-servants of God," he told them "I bring you affectionate greetings from the members of the Methodist church in America."

"We seek nothing in Russia for ourselves. Our only desire is to help you in a critical hour. Tell us what to do. Our resources are limited, but our desires to assist are great."

"Eyes of World on Russia"

Bishop Blake, too, declared that the church could not stand aside in the struggle of the state, but must always be prepared to co-operate with and assist the government. The soviet rule, he said, is dedicated to social service and the welfare of the people.

"The eyes of the world are resting upon Russia this minute," he said.

The translation of Bishop Blake's speech was somewhat incorrect, but despite this the speech made the most favorable impression. To show in what high esteem the Russian prelates held him, the congress elected Bishop Blake an honorary member of the board after a lengthy prayer in his behalf.

There were 380 delegates present. Among the metropolitans were Antonin, of Moscow; Pierre, of Siberia; Nicolai, from the Ukraine, and Tikhon, of Kiev.

The caucus worked perfectly during the election of the board. Antonin was chosen president; Pierre, secretary, and Krasnitsky and Wedensky, members of the executive committee, together with a number of other bishops and priests.

Antonin welcomed the delegates with a speech, but undoubtedly the plea of Wedensky was the feature of the session. His oratorical power is expected to control the three weeks' meeting. Official action in regard to the prosecution of Tikhon is expected to be taken at the next session.
