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TO TAKE OVER POLYTECHNIC

Pinder-Moss Proposes to Relieve School Board of all Responsibility for \$200 a Year

A proposal from John Pinder-Moss, director of the Northern Polytechnic Institute, whereby the school board will pay him \$200 annually and he will undertake the responsibility of conducting the work without further expense to the school board after August, was tentatively adopted by the school board last night providing the arrangement passes the city solicitor and the school board will be guaranteed against responsibility for accounts providing the scheme should prove a failure.

In submitting his proposal, Mr. Pinder-Moss said that it would be necessary to turn the government grants over to him, he would suggest that more central quarters for the holding of the classes be obtained than those used at present and that the school board pay for janitor service, heat and light. It was his idea to develop continuation school work in the surrounding district with Prince Rupert as headquarters. Terrace was willing to come in and other points, he thought, would also enter.

Mr. Parker said he would be in favor of the proposal if the school board was relieved of all liability outside of the \$200. Mr. Pinder-Moss assured him that such would be the case. If necessary he would be bonded. He did not think it would be a failure, however, because so far it had been successful.

Other members of the board felt that the arrangement would be satisfactory if the board were protected. Accordingly the matter was referred to the city solicitor for report.

Mr. Pinder-Moss asked if \$500 left over from this year's operation would be turned over to him to assist in launching the new scheme which he would have to finance himself. The board assured him that this would be done if the scheme were adopted.
