

German Government has Resigned Following an Adverse Reichstag Vote

BERLIN, Nov. 24.—Gustav Stresemann last night resigned as chancellor when the Reichstag voted 230 to 155 denying his cabinet a vote of confidence. After the ballot Stresemann tendered the resignation of himself and cabinet which President Ebert accepted.

American Schooner Damaged but Temporary Repairs Are Made at Lowe Inlet

The American halibut schooner Hi Gill, on her way south to Seattle where she will lay up for the winter, hit the .rocky shore of Pitt Island across from Kleunuggit light in Grenville Channel last Tuesday night at 11 o'clock. She broke her stem post and was leaking badly so put into Lowe Inlet which place she left yesterday continuing south under her own power after temporary repairs had been effected.

Capt. Ben Herem and the engineer are taking the Hi Gill south while the two other members of the crew, Ludwig Klewen and C. Larsen, reached the city on the Venture yesterday afternoon.
