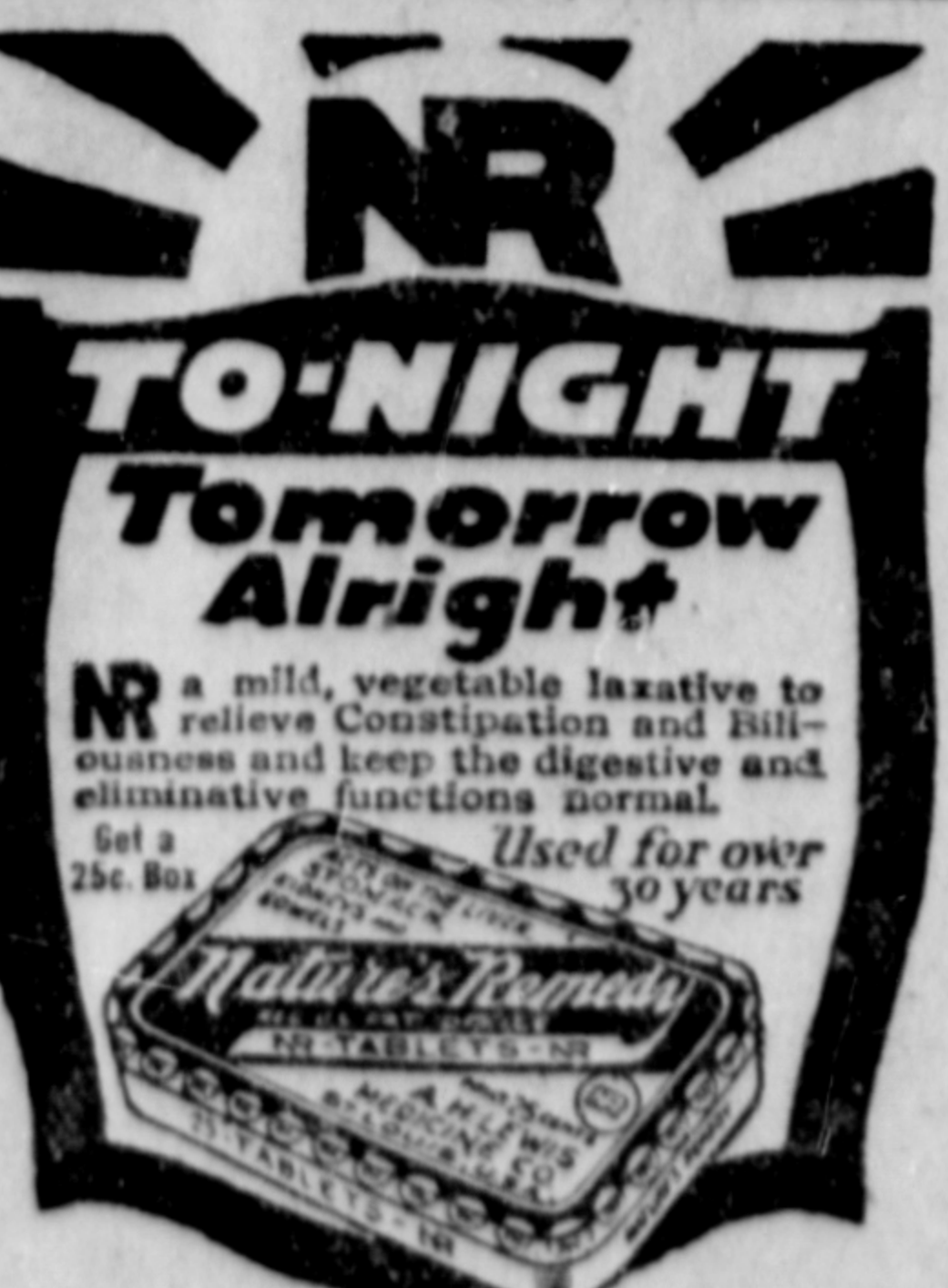
At the meeting of the city council held last night in the City Hall, a report was read from the Housing Committee recommending that the house of John Munro be rented immediately for \$35 a month. The report was adopted.

A committee was appointed at last night's meeting of the Trades & Labor Council to wait on Hon. A. M. Manson, provincial minister of labor, on his return from Ontario, in connection with the Oriental question and other problems affecting labor.

It was decided at last night's meeting of the Trades & Labor Council to send three delegates to represent Prince Rupert at the Dominion Congress which will be held in Vancouver in August. Instructions are already being prepared although the delegates have not yet been appointed.

Tonight at the Anglican Church there will be an address on Religious Education by Canon Simpson, Western secretary to the Board of Religious Education for the Church of England. This lecture will be preceded by moving pictures shown by Rev. Jas. Gillett of Massett. All are invited to come.

Passengers booked for the south on the Prince George tomorrow night include E. Brown, J. Zarelli, Mrs. Henning and son and Miss R. Wall.

Frank Fitch, acting customs officer at Port Simpson, was in town yesterday, arriving on the Chelohsin and returning north by gas boat this morning.

Certificates for first and second year High School students are being issued by Principal Brady and those students who have not yet received them can get them at the High School.

F. H. Penn, manager of the Belmont-Surf Inlet mine, returned south last night on the Chelohsin after having spent a couple of days in the city on business. Mrs. Penn accompanied him.

G. S. Fitzmaurice, of Cassiar cannery, R. Gibson, of Port Essington and A. Edwards, of Haysport, visited the city yesterday and underwent examination by the pensions medical board which is visiting the city.

Mayor Newton read a telegram received from city clerk Jones, who is at present in Victoria to represent the city in the Grand Trunk assessment appeal case, to the effect that the case would not be heard until Thursday instead of yesterday as was previously thought.

The charge of perjury laid against John Mittenan, of Stewart, following his arrest which was ordered in the County Court last week by Judge Robertson in the course of the W. J. Tibbitts liquor appeal case, was dismissed in the city police court this morning by Magistrate McGlynn. W. O. Fulton appeared for the prosecution and Milton Gonzales for the defence.

The Fire Chief's report for the month of May, read at the council meeting last night, stated that two fire calls had been responded to during the month amounting to a loss of \$12. Department expenditures amounted to \$1,084.32. An inspection had been made of all fire alarm boxes, hydrants and schools which had been found to be in satisfactory order. The report was ordered filed.

At the meeting of the city council last night a report was read from the Board of Works recommending that J. Laursen be employed by the city to supervise the construction of Hays Creek bridge, under the city engineer, at the rate of \$5.00 per day for an eight hour day. It was moved by Ald. Perry and seconded by Ald. Mackenzie that the report be adopted and the motion was carried.

The fire department had a call at 3:30 yesterday afternoon to the corner of Fifth Avenue and Bowser Street to extinguish a grass fire. There was no damage to property.

The Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co.'s trawler Andrew Kelly left yesterday afternoon for the halibut banks on her first voyage of the season. The G. E. Foster is preparing to leave for her second voyage in a day or so.

The G.N.B. steamer Prince George, Capt. W. S. Moorehouse, due from Vancouver and wayports at 3 this afternoon, is reported on time. She has on board 16 loggers for Buckley Bay who will transfer to the Prince John tonight.

The following passengers are booked to sail for the Islands on the Prince John tonight: B. Perrott for Thurston Harbor; J. Ames for Massett; Mrs. Shickerton and son for Buckley Bay; W. Hastie, Port Clements; W. A. Andrews, Skidegate.

Harry Martin, provincial constable returned yesterday afternoon on the Chelohsin from Anyox having in charge an insane man, Thomas Davis, who is in the hands of the city police preparatory to being sent to the New Westminster asylum.

Fred Roberge received a telegram this morning from the Alaska Steamship Company at Seattle stating that the steamer Alaska would leave Seattle Saturday morning and arrive here Monday. This is the time when she picks up the Brooklyn Eagle party bound for Alaska points.

L. S. Richardson, chief clerk to B. C. Keeley, Pacific Coast manager of the Canadian Government Merchant Marine, returned south on the Chelohsin last night after having spent a day in the city in connection with the loading of the Canadian Transporter. Mrs. Richardson accompanied him.

The regular Senior League baseball game scheduled for Friday night between the Grotto and Gil's will be played tonight instead, the change having been made owing to the fact that there will be a practice game on Friday night for the select team which will play here with Anyox next Monday.

A letter from the Prince Rupert Swimming Club was read at the meeting of the city council last night asking for a grant of \$500 in order that the necessary repairs to the floats, dam and children's paddling pool could be carried out. It was moved by Alderman Mackenzie that no grant be made to the swimming club in view of the straitened condition of the city finances. The motion was seconded by Alderman Stephens and carried.

TORONTO, June 27.—A storm which swept Ontario Monday night caused five deaths and property loss of \$1,000,000.

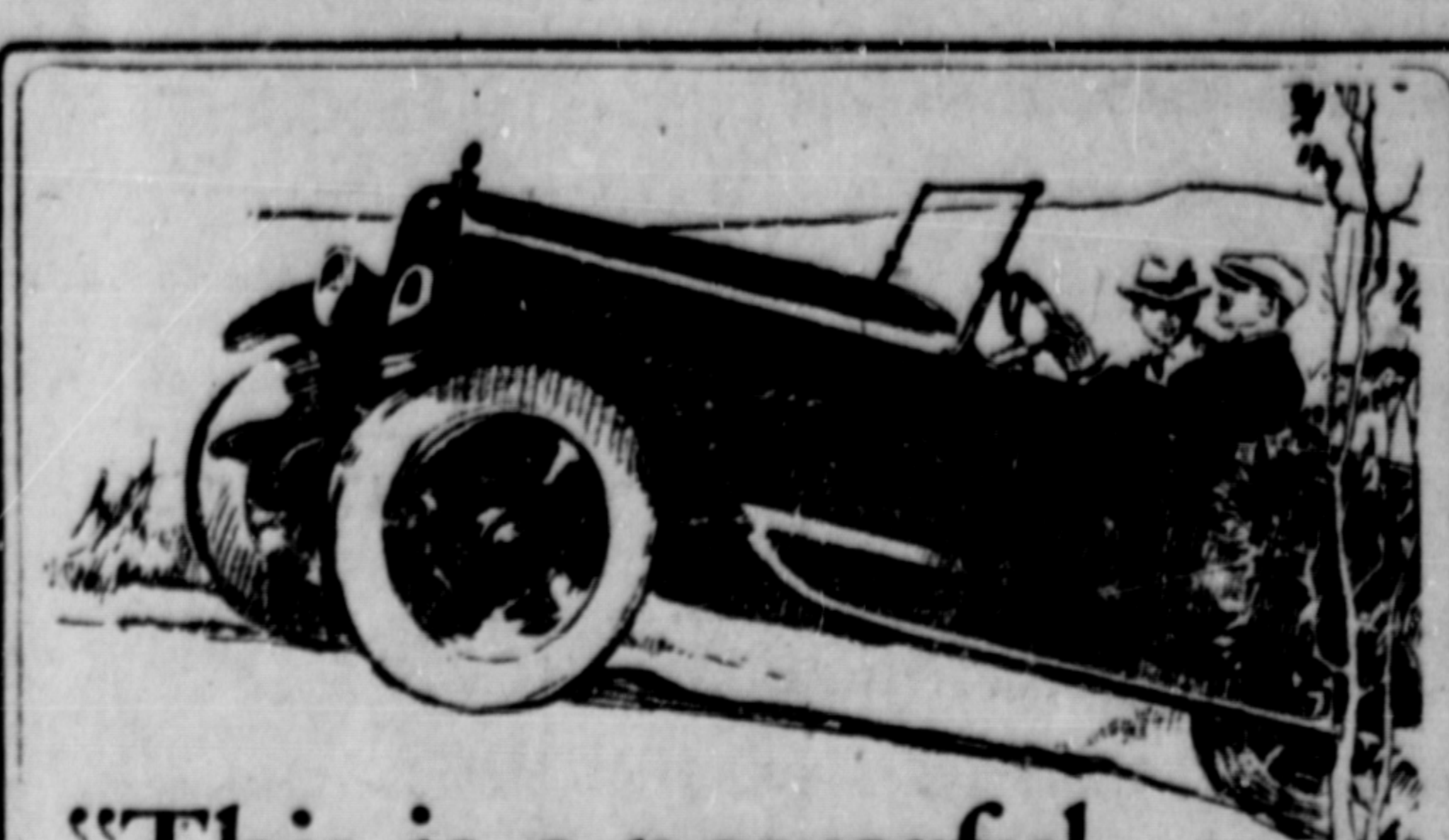
