

Opulent Woolens Shown At London Fashion Festival

LONDON—Britain, the United States, France and Italy pooled resources to give a brilliant send-off to overseas buyers attending Britain's annual fashion fortnight.

Forty-four famous houses, 11 from each country, designed from outfits viewed at London's Savoy Hotel by 300 delegates from many countries including Canada. The Duchess of Gloucester was guest of honor. France opened the show with the type of clothes every woman would like to wear. There was a tight-skirted Donegal tweed dress in black and white mixture with button front, mandarin collar and fluted peplum giving the effect of a two-piece suit. A long stole finished by a deep fringe suggested the elegance of a three-quarter coat fluting from a deep yoke.

Donegal tweed was Jacques Fath's choice for a knife-slim dress with double button front, its V-neck emphasized by cross-over tuck of white pique that matched the huge, choir-boy collar on a matching bolero. Long white nurses' cuffs finished the light sleeves of the dress, appearing also to cuff the bolero.

ITALIAN STYLES
Drama was the key-note of Italian styles such as the black and scarlet after-ski suit with skin-tight pants, wide-sleeved black mandarin blouse and a sleeveless smock coat that could be worn as a sun dress.

A loose anthracite grey top-coat, lined with black wool and trimmed with black astrakan worn over a slim, strapless cocktail dress with black braid and jet embroidery, in no way lessened the dramatic theme.

Expert Woman Angler Misses Good Streams

HALIFAX—Mrs. Florence Whittaker, Nova Scotia's female Izaak Walton, is spending the angling season in bed this year, an unwilling patient in hospital here.

While recovering from an operation, she can only dream of the bubbling streams and placid lakes where she fished along with the best of them during the last 30 years. It will be some months before she can hike again over the rugged terrain near her home at Sherbrooke for the fish she hopes will still be there.

It was more than 30 years ago that her grandfather, himself an avid fisherman, first interested her in the sport. Since then she has fished all the rivers in mainland Nova Scotia, mostly for salmon.

Her first honor was a silver award from the Halifax County Fish and Game Association for catching the largest Atlantic salmon—a 22-inch beauty. She was one of that association's first female members and later became the first woman member of the St. Mary's Fish and Game Association.

Then she became a registered guide—"so that I could take part in their competitions," was the real reason," she says. In her first year at the Nova Scotia Guides' Association meet, 1933, she made a cast of more than 98 feet with a salmon rod.
