SURVEY ERROR PUTS BUILDING IN WRONG PLACE

A surveying mistake made in 1941 was brought to the attention of city council last night when Carl Poulsen, owner of property at the corner of Sixth Avenue East and the dry dock road, asked for a release from the encroachment of his property on land leased by the city from Canadian National Railways.

According to verbal information given to City Clerk Thain by Mr. Poulsen, an error in surveying land which Poulsen bought from the C.N.R. in 1941 resulted in him constructing buildings on land now leased by the railroad to the city for roadway. The building extends 11.8 feet onto city-leased property.

Prior to approaching the city, Mr. Poulsen sought to lease the C.N.R. property on which his building extends but was told that the railway company could not extend his lease to encroach on the city's lease without the city's permission.

The aldermen decided that there was still enough land left for a roadway and moved that Mr. Poulsen be notified to ask for a release from encroachment in writing.
