NEW SERVICE IS REVEALED

Complaints Being Made at New Run to Queen Charlotte Islands

Under drastic and complicated schedule changes being made by Union Steamships Ltd. for its vessels on the Vancouver-Prince Rupert run, the Queen Charlotte Islands service will be combined with the Inside Passage run and the service to Ocean Falls, Bella Coola, Alice Arm, Stewart and Port Simpson will be cut from weekly to fortnightly. Already some protest is being heard in local business circles, particularly at the Islands service which, it is declared, will they claim make the Islands almost entirely tributary to Vancouver instead of Prince Rupert as far as ordering and delivery of supplies is concerned. Council of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce has been called into session this afternoon to consider the situation.

Union Steamships is withdrawing its new corvette vessels entirely from service for the remainder of the winter and is also taking the veteran Cassiar off the Islands service in which she has operated for nearly 40 years. Report has it that the Cassiar has already been sold and will go to China waters to finish out her days.

The new service will be maintained by the steamers Catala and Cardena. One week the Catala, leaving Vancouver Friday night, will come north by way of Bella Coola, Ocean Falls and numerous other coast points, arriving at Prince Rupert early Tuesday mornings and sailing from Tuesday mornings at 10 o'clock on her return south. Alternate weeks the Catala will arrive from the south early Monday mornings, sailing at 10

Reminiscences By W.J. and Reflections

First Civic Election Recalled—They Took Real Interest Then—Stork Elected Mayor

Tomorrow those entitled to cast ballots for mayor and aldermen will vote. And right here, one can almost hear somebody murmur: "and if they don't, they should." Interest has not been exactly feverish. The bus franchise issue would appear to be the liveliest issue.

Prince Rupert's first municipal election had plenty of pep. Weeks prior to official nomination, the campaign was well away. Prospective candidates never tried to hide the urge for public service that was commencing to stir within them. They did not hesitate to solicit support. The approaching election was the real thing—not the only—subject to command general attention and, through the arguments and letters to the papers, could be traced the hand of partisan politics. It was not openly visible, yet nevertheless there.

The first of all the civic campaigns here was in May, 1910. It was a beautiful day for any kind of a fight—calm and clear, with a few surprises at the finish.

Fred Stork and William Manson ran for the mayoralty, and Fred won. When the result became known, someone got off a pleasantry—to the effect that as Prince Rupert needed population as soon as possible, it was advisable to have a Stork for mayor.

Here are the names of the first council:
 Mayor, Fred Stork.
 Aldermen—V. W. Smith, T. D. Pattullo, Frank Mobley, W. P. Lynch, Arthur Barrow, George Naden, Dr. A. A. McIntyre, J. H. Hilditch. They were all representative men and, on the whole,

measured up well to the weighty responsibilities that were shouldered.

The salutes will be fired on the 12 saluting stations across Canada.
