FINE PROGRAM AT ST. PETER'S

Interesting Variety Concert By Young Peoples Association

An interesting program of drama, music and merriment, was presented in the St. Peter's Hall Friday and Saturday evenings by the St. Peter's Young Peoples Association at their annual Christmas concert to the delight of the audience which filled the hall both nights.

Following this Lavina Elliott sang two numbers. Her pretty soprano voice did full justice to the beautiful "Sorrento" and timely "Christmas Dreaming".

A gang of YPA members then gathered around the piano to sing a comedy rendition of "Darktown Strutters' Ball" with Dick Large accompanying.

A bagpipe solo by Jim Nicoll pleased all, especially the Scottish element, to whom the familiar skills evidently brought back many a pleasant memory. A timely recitation of Longfellow's "Christmas Bells" by Pat Tipton was the program's next item.

As explained by Rowley Beecher towards the close of the evening, the Johnson Christmas Tree Fund is being perpetuated by donations from organizations and private individuals. Since the early days of 'terrace, the community Christmas tree was held each year with the donations of the citizens. In those days, a small gift would be given to each child but the young population has increased to such an extent that the past few years candy, fruit and nuts have been distributed to the children. And there have been times when the community could not do even that. But, through the big-heartedness of a bachelor who loved children, a fund was started with \$500 left in the will of the late William Johnson, a veteran of World War I, for this specific purpose. Managed by Emil Haugland, Sam Kirkaldy and Rawley Beecher, this fund is kept going and the children are assured of a Christmas tree for years to come.

Richard Tweed, with his own guitar accompaniment sang several poignant western songs. Richard's sister, Hazel, joined with him in his last number for a duet, "Down in the Valley", followed by the ever loved "White Christmas".

The highlight of the evening was a play, "The Pampered Darling", a comedy in one act about two sisters, the success of whose Christmas plans for a house party was threatened by their brat of a brother, who pretends to be struck deaf and dumb to keep the girls' plans from working out.
