

LATEST U.S. ARMY HELICOPTER-The XR-12 a new fiveplace helicopter designed and built for the army air forces by the Bell Aircraft Corporation. It is now undergoing preliminary tests at the manufacturer's plant in Buffalo, New York. The new aircraft has a top speed of 105 mbiles per hour and an operating speed of 90 miles per hour. Its range is 300 miles and it can climb vertically at a rate of 450 feet per minute. Its service ceiling is 13,000 feet and its hovering ceiling 4,350 feet. The XR-12 carres a useful load of 1,630 pounds. The two-bladed main rotor has a diameter of 47 feet, six inches.
