

British Troops on Rampage In Tel Aviv-Jews Attack Regiment Headquarters

JERUSALEM. (P) - An attack was launched yesterday on headquarters of the Hampshire Regiment. Hand grenades and mortars were used and one of the attackers was killed. No announcement was made concerning military casualties, if any. The regimental headquarters is only 200 yards away from the building of the Jewish Agency.

The attack came after British soldiers and Palestine police had launched a twin investigation of shootings Thursday night in the all-Jewish metropolis of Tel Aviv when five Jews were killed and scores of others injured.
