United States Record Crossing Of Atlantic at Speed of 41 mph

ABOARD SS UNITED STATES AT SEA-The sleek new super liner United StateNs completed her maiden Atlantic crossing today in a record of three days, 10 hours and 40 minutes, copping the trans-Atlantic speed ribbon for the U.S. for the first time in 83 years.

Her first run was 10 hours two minutes faster than the record set 14 years ago by the British Cunard liner Queen Mary. The 53,000-ton vessel averaged 35.59 knots about 41 land miles an hour on 2,938 mile crossing.

WARRINGTON, England-(Reuters)-Teacher R. B. Maddock said today American "slang" had so corrupted his boys

that they now regard correct English as "sissy stuff." Maddock said he had taken steps to counteract the influence of American comic books and the conversation of U.S. airmen at a base two miles from his school.

He said he had arranged for the boys to hear famous sportsmen-men they could regard as being "sissy"-speaking good English on the radio.
