

COUNCIL FAVORS UNION TAG DAY

for "Defence" Fund Bill 39 Okayed

Application by the United and Allied Workers to hold a tag day in aid of a "defence" fund for striking B. C. workers arrested under the Bill 39 was approved by council last night by a margin that, in effect, re-affirmed the decision made by the council.

A stormy period of argument followed by a verbal appeal made by Stan Boshier, secretary of the U.F.A.W.N., who said funds raised by the tag day would be used to help legal counsel for 100 workers who have been arrested under Bill 39 labor legislation.

T. B. Black based his motion on the request on the fact that it had come from the Trades and Labor Council, central labor union body in the city.

He attempted to amend a motion by Alderman Casey, favoring the tag day, by adding that "council will consider the request if placed by the Trades and Labor Council." The amendment, seconded by Alderman McKay, was defeated.

In answer to Alderman Back's amendment, Mr. Boshier declared that "it is not our understanding of the Municipal Act that it be required that a central group make application for a tag day. I cannot see that there has been any precedent set that I should have to represent more than one organization."

In seconding Alderman Casey's motion that the request be granted, Alderman George Rudderham said that the arrested workers were "not guilty merely because they have been arrested. Those people are entitled to all the support that the Prince Rupert people may care to give."

Alderman Ham said that he could not see where the request "falls within the scope of a legitimate tag day" and presented an amendment that "no children under 17 be allowed to solicit on the streets for that purpose." His amendment failed to find a second.

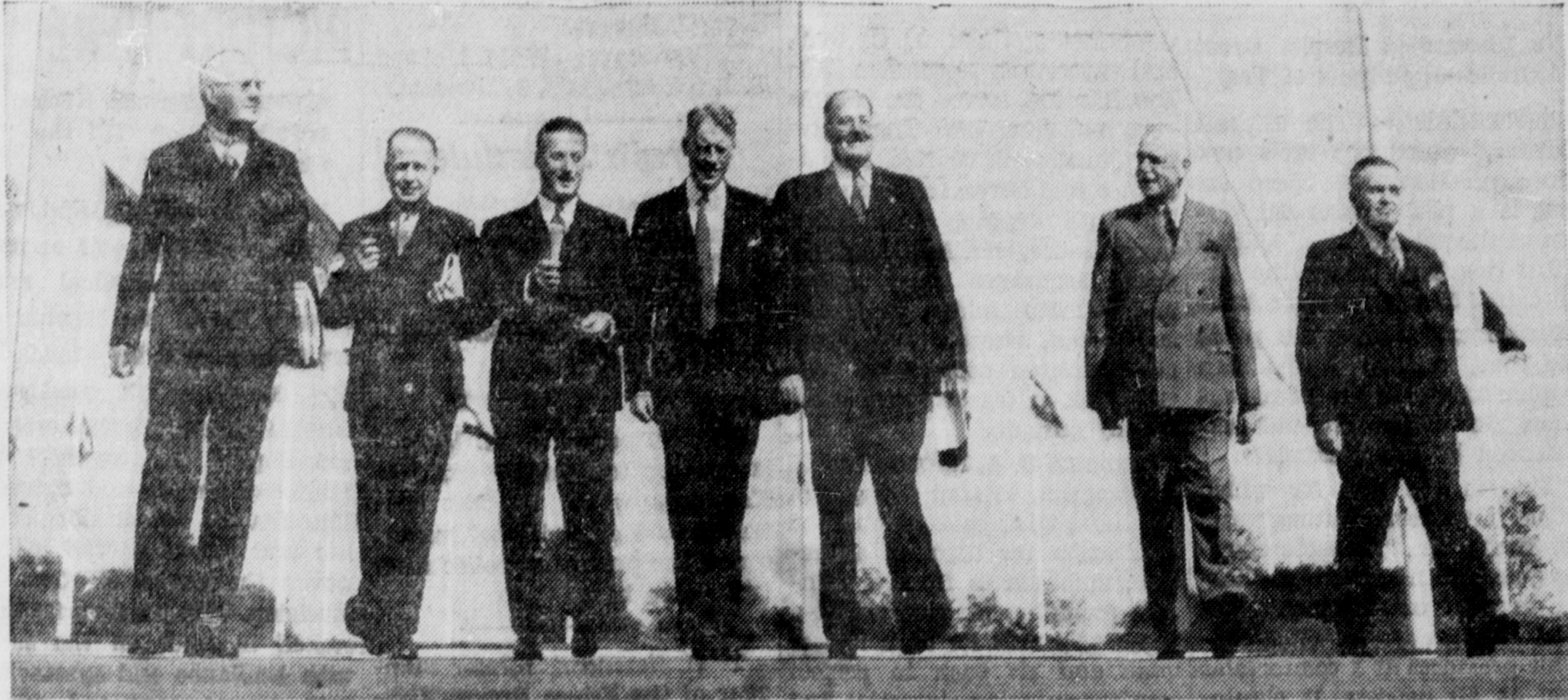

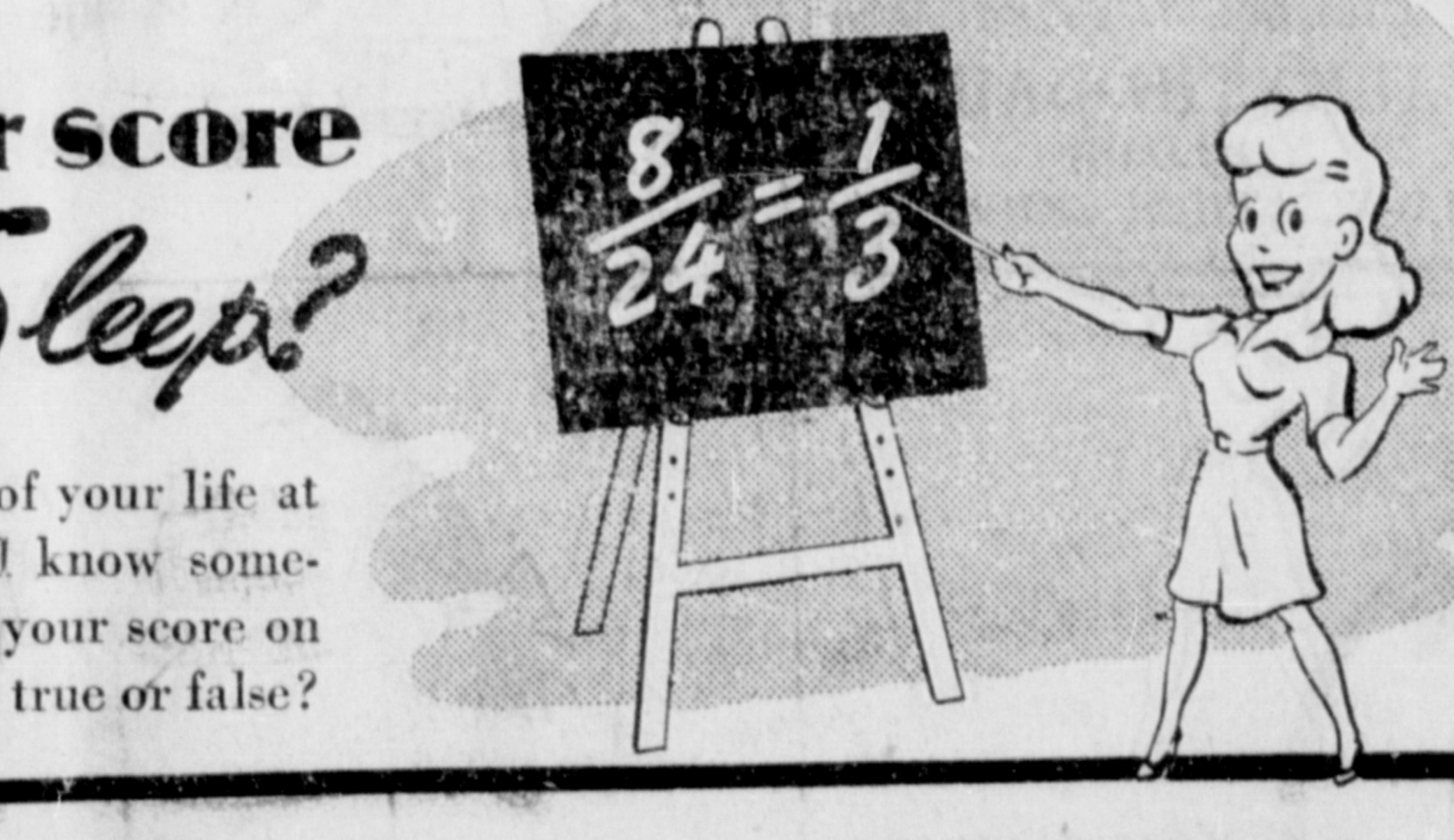
