TRANSPORT IS PROBLEM OF

The problems of immigration of Eurapeans into Canada are mainly those of transportation, rather than of restrictive Canadian laws, according to Dr. Hugh L. Keenleyside, who as deputy minister of mines and resources, administers the Immigration branch.

"Canadian immigration laws easy and will admit a large number of persons but there are few boats at the present time to transport them," he told executive members of the Chamber of Commerce at an informal dinner last night.

Present laws will admit people from the United Kingdom and the United States, practically without restriction, other than a health certificate, while immigration from continental Europe. especially the west, has been opened considerably.




