Shields, pastor of Jarvis Street Baptist Church of Toronto, in an address at Patterson Collegiate. With the gradual development of the Roman Catholic Church in Canada, Dr. Shields said, Protestant liberties will be removed and then it will come to a major decision between the two religious factions. Dr. Shields claimed that many departments of government were "loaded with Roman Catholics who, if there were civil strife, would rise up as a solid front." He charged that the Vatican had instigated the last two wars and that it was again trying "to force war on Britain, France and the United States."

"I have no use for Russian idealism," Dr. Shields said. "I believe in individualism but I consider Russia the most slandered country in the world to-
