Canadian Legion Criticises Failure of Association

Some disappointment was registered last evening at the regular meeting of the local branch of the Canadian Legion over the failure of the Prince Rupert Football Association to keep the soccer sport alive here. It was stated that no annual meeting of the association had been called for the past two years at least. As a result a once active sport had been allowed to die. The situation was particularly regrettable as there had been no practices for the players who should represent the city against a team from H.M.S. Kenya in the Hanson Cup Competition. It was pointed out that technically the game should be arranged by the Football Association but, as the association had failed to carry on, the Legion decided to take the matter into its own hands. They appointed a committee to make the necessary arrangements, and to work with James Nicoll, Legion entertainment committee chairman. Veteran footballers J. S. Wilson, Jack McCreish and Fred Harvey were named. Players who would be available for the game are asked to contact any of these through P. M. Ray, secretary-manager of the Legion.

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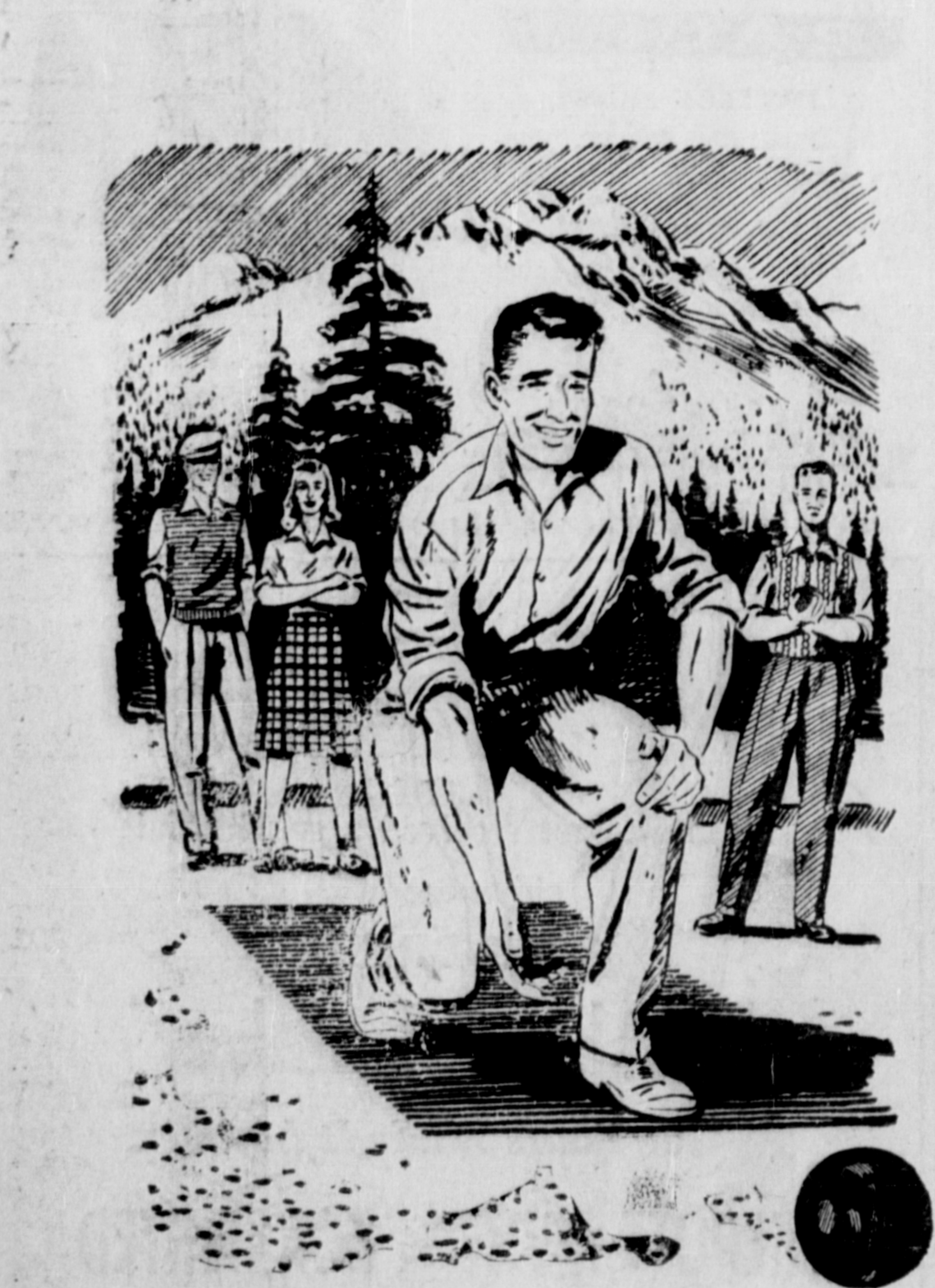
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
