JERUSALEM (P)-A double Arab attack on the Jewish city of Tel Aviv broke the Moslem Sabbath calm shortly after noon yesterday and plunged Palestine into a fourth day of duced by Alderman Rudderham, fighting in which forty-four persons, 21 of them Jews, have been killed. Hundreds have been wounded and damage has amounted to millons of dollars. Arab mobs struck at Hatikvah and Zablawi, quarters of Tel Aviv, a few minutes after Moslem congregations streamed from mosques in neighboring Jaffa.

> Hatikvah, first target, was raked by gunfire which was returned by Hagana, the Jewish underground defence force. One Jew was known to be dead and another wounded.

Five minutes later shots were started in the Zablawi quarter. While fighting went on in the Jaffa-Tel Aviv border area, Jerusalem appeared for the most part to be quiet.
