SHOE PRICES UP AS GOVERNMENT AIDS WITHDRAWN

Supplies of shoes in Prince Rupert are good but prices are going up, according to local merchants. This rise, of course, is in line with increasing costs of most articles. Fortunately for customers, city stores stocked up well with shoes at the old prices, which saving is being passed on by the merchants. New shipments will carry the new prices. Open-toed shoes for women are still leading the field but there is a swing away from the ultra-open styles.

"Women are going in more for pumps, once again," reports one merchant.

GREATER RANGE OF STYLES IN RUBBERS
During the war years, styles in rubbers were cut from 400 to 19, but the range is on the increase again.

Slippers, always popular gifts for Christmas, are in good supply for all members of the family. Cute, dainty slippers for children are especially attractive this year.

Because of the increasing cost of leather, shoe merchants are predicting a decided swing next spring and summer to running shoes and scampers for children.

As a further measure to offset price increases, more and more men's and women's shoes are expected to carry rubber and composition soles instead of leather.

Of course, little difficulty is expected in obtaining better grade shoes—at substantially boosted prices.

POPULARITY OF PLASTIC SHOES DROPS OFF
"Popularity of women's plastic shoes has eased off this winter," another merchant reports.

In a letter to retail shoemen, the Shoe Manufacturers' Association of Canada does not paint a bright picture for the future. The Canadian shoe industry was thrown into confusion this fall by the Canadian government's action in lifting ceilings and discontinuing subsidies on hides.

Leather prices jumped immediately. Calf leather is up more than 100 per cent and sole leather has risen about 35 per cent. Foreign leathers, used in certain types of footwear, are increasing by 35 to 50 per cent. Labor costs, too, have gone up.

SHORT SPORT

Four times Canadian chess champion and at 22 one of the worlds youngest chess masters, Abe Yanofsky of Winnipeg may soon be leaving Canada for six years to study medicine at Glasgow or London. Yanofsky, whose ambition is to become a doctor, has applications entered at universities in both cities. He must be in Glasgow within the first six months of next year to be interviewed for acceptance there, but to date London hasn't said when he must report. He already has a bachelor of science degree from the University of Manitoba, conferred in 1944 before he joined the navy for two years' service.

Abe hopes to reach Europe in time to watch the six top chess masters compete for the world's champion. He has been asked to second defending champion Dr. Max Euwe of Holland at the 12-week tournament, half of which will be played in Holland and half in Russia, beginning in April.

Last year in Holland, Yanofsky was acknowledged a chess master after finishing 14th in a field of 20 of the most prominent players. His average of victories was well above the 30 per cent required for such rating. The recognition climaxed his tour of the continent and British Isles. Although playing the game since he was 8½ years old, he doesn't eat, sleep and breathe chess. In fact, he last played in the United States open chess tournament last summer at Corpus Christi, Texas, where he finished tied for second place.
