* and Prince Rupert since June 15. Stops along the way will give similar service to Sandspit (Queen Charlotte Islands) and Port Hardy (Vancouver Island).

Granting of the air mail service follows representations seeking same which were made recently by the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce, City of Prince Rupert, Junior Chamber of Commerce, Public Relations Council, Prince Rupert Industrial Development Committee and other organizations.

The service means that first class mail posted in Vancouver or Prince Rupert in the morning will be delivered at the other end by evening. Heretofore the fastest time for mail between Prince Rupert and Vancouver has been thirty-six hours.

British Foreign Secretary **Addresses His Own Union**

HASTINGS, Eng., @- Ernest Bevin, foreign secretary. declared it is right and proper for Europe to make a claim upon American productive genius to aid in the reconstruction of the continent's economy.

Bevin declared that General Marshall, United States Secretary of State, in offering aid to Europe had said in effect: "See what you can do for yourselves and we will supplement what you do."

I think it is right they should supplement it, Bevin added, in an address to the Transport and General Workers' Union to which he belongs.
