

# Mystery In 'Anger' Case

Los Angeles Reports Wilssing

Yachtsman of That Name

Further mystery has developed in the case of the man calling himself Gerald W. Anger, alias Andrew Young, who arrived in Prince Rupert last Friday with a story of a 1,600-mile life boat trip across the Gulf of Alaska which followed a shipwreck off the Aleutian Islands.

The stocky, deeply-tanned man, who gave his age at different times as 47, 48 and 49, called himself "Andrew Young" when he landed from his 16-foot sail boat five days ago, but later changed it to Gerald W. Anger when his effects had been seized and searched in the local Customs House.

And therein lies the mystery.

In his original story, Anger, then posing as Andrew Young, claimed that his 62-foot auxiliary schooner "Hao" foundered 150 miles off Unalaska Island in the Aleutian chain on May 21 when it struck a floating log. He said he was enroute from Norfolk Island in the South Pacific, to Kodiak at the time.

Today, however, a despatch from Los Angeles says that the 62-foot schooner "Lee." with Gerald W. Anger, as master, has been unreported since leaving Nunizak Island, Alaska, for the California-Honolulu yaeht race.

It arouses an interesting question of whether the man who ealls himself Anger and who is in the city jail knows of the Gerald W. Anger reported missing from Los Angeles or if the Gerald W. Anger of Los Angeles may be fictitious. The "local" Anger said that he had spent the last three months in Ketchikan. He had a number of envelopes carrying the name "Dr. Gerald W. Anger, P.O. Box 375, Ketchikan, Alaska."

The Los Angeles report was not specific as to whether or not there actually was a Gerald W. Anger known at Los Angeles, or if a report had merely been received from the north telling of the disappearance of such a man.

The man held in jail here may be sent back to Ketchikan where he said, his lifeboat voyage originated.

# BEING MOVED

Nuernburgh to Berlin Prison

Being Transferred From

BERLIN (P Brigadier General Cornelius Ryan, assistant deputy American military governor, said yesterday that preparations had been completed for the transfer of Rudolph Hess and six other convicted Nazi war criminals from Nuernburgh to Spandan prison in Betrlin.

"This is for safety and security reasons" Ryan told the press. "There will be no advance publicity when they come in."
