Reminiscences and Reflections

Once upon a time, the blueprint of a majestic hotel found its way to Prince Rupert, and the sturdy pioneers with drooping chops, looked it over... It was all in line with what they had been led to believe was going to happen. An excavation was blasted, but instead of a hotel, there came forth a fountain—and a pleasant, refreshing sight as fountains go. Later in Rupert's storied history, Sir Henry Thornton tarried in town, and conversations again turned to places of entertainment. But nothing passed beyond that stage. The fountain kept functioning and by and by a flawless bowling green moved up handy, to be neighborly. However, keep your fingers crossed. The first forty years are always the hardest. And the time, now, is just about up.

Ever since tourists began first to hop, skip and jump over the townsite (that, of course was pretty darned early, yet they did) that building on a great rock, near 2nd Avenue and 5th Street, was to them, a fascination that never lost its lure. It is questionable if any place here has, through the years, been more photographed. Originally the home of the Prince Rupert Club, many a diverting tale might be heard could its walls speak. Many gatherings, social and business, have been held there. The day will come, of course, when the rock will go. It would seem almost a shame. For it has the charm of novelty and "something different"—which is becoming rare enough in this age of would-be copy cats and regimentation.

When railway construction was giving the grand shakeup to the Skeena River valley and townsite of Prince Rupert, presumably astute folk said it was dynamiting that was causing rain. It sounded logical, as well as noisy. But the years have disclosed something else again. It did not work out that way. After trains were running, wet weather would sometimes last for weeks. And there have been times when grass and turf turned so dry, the firemen were needed. You cannot figure Prince Rupert's climate, which has many good points, after all. It may be pleasant in March and not so hot in June. Take yesterday for example. Gray dawn, and most of forenoon the dour clouds streamed. But the afternoon and all of the long evening could challenge any
