F. HEMMONS PASSES AWAY

Veteran of First World War Lived Here 27 Years
Fletcher Hemmons, a resident of Prince Rupert for the last 27 years and a veteran of the First World War, died in Prince Rupert General Hospital Sunday afternoon at the age of 65 after an illness of several weeks.
Born in Liverpool, England, he served in the merchant marine prior to the First World War. He saw service in France with the Seventh Battalion, C.E.F., and returned to the sea for a short period after the war. He settled in Prince Rupert in 1920 following several occupations during the years.
In the Second World War, he was employed as a watchman for the American Army.
He is survived by his wife, seven sons, Fletcher, Glen, Stanley, James, Ronald and Allan, at home, and Cecil in Vancouver and two daughters, Ethel, at home, and Ellen, Mrs. A. P. Lucas, of Kansas City, Kansas.
Funeral arrangements will be announced later.

New Zealanders Boycott Beer In Protest At Price Boost

GREYMOOUTH, N.Z. —Driest place in New Zealand recently has been Westland Province, in the South Island, where the rainfall is about 200 inches a year, easily the heaviest in the country.
Traditionally hearty drinkers, the West Coasters have been grimly observing a beer boycott as a protest against an increase in price of two cents a glass. The boycott was declared by the Trades Council, controlling the grade union body in the district and has been observed by most unionists, though tempers have become frayed as a result and there have been several clashes.

One sawmill had to close down for a time. A bushman felling trees for the mill refused to observe the boycott and continued to buy his beer after work. Envious members of his gang stood it for a while and then refused to work with him. It was several days before they could be persuaded to return to work to enable the mill to resume.
