# VETERAN KILLS

Tragedy in Ottawa-Dr. Murray Bowie Victim of Vancouver Man

OTTAWA (P)-Dr. Murray R. Bowie, 37-year-old pensions examiner, was shot to death today in the Canadian pensions commissioner's offices here by a disgruntled First World War veteran who then killed himself with a bullet through the heart.

Department of Veterans' Affairs officials identified the veteran as Henry Page, 59, who came from Vancouver to Ottawa two months ago.

Both doctor and assailant died instantly in Dr. Bowie's uptown office just off the capital city's main business district.
