Everyone else is doing it and just so we won't be left on a limb by ourselves we'd better jump back into the current Arney-Forman controversy. This corner goes on record as heartily endorsing the sentiments expressed by "Spectator" in yesterday's "Letterbox." That spectators are anxious to see clean, competitive basketball goes without saying and we feel that the local league should either treat us to some exhibitions of real basketball or follow the suggestion that they take up some other game. The Basketball Association has fallen down very badly in that they have, apparently, failed to back up the decisions rendered by their referees during games. It seems obvious to us that, when the referees had banished two players from a game—one for a flagrant foul, the other for a display of unsportsmanlike conduct—that the Basketball Association should then have meted out to the players concerned whatever suspension or other form of penalty seemed appropriate.
