MYSTERIES OF SONICS

Plane Helpless After It Goes Faster Than Sound

(By RALPH DIGHTON) INYOKERN, Calif.— Suppose you were the first person in the world to fly a plane faster than sound.

You'd be sailing along in one of these new jet jobs, gradually increasing your speed to 600 then 700 miles an hour. At this speed you'd practically out-run the sound of your engine. Now, give the jets a little more juice.

What happens? Nothing, you think, except that you go a little faster? That, mister, could be a fatal mistake.

Something tremendous happens when your speed exceeds that of sound. You get the funny feeling that your plane suddenly is flying backwards. Your control pressures are reversed. If you want to turn right, you don't swing your rudder to the right as you did at conventional speeds. You have to swing it to the left. You're helpless until you get the feel of the new controls. And at 750 miles an hour or more, you can't afford to be helpless very long.

What the "tremendous something" is that happens when a plane crosses the "sonic (sound) barrier," as scientists phrase it, is robbing plane designers of a lot of sleep these nights. It can't be figured out on paper, because there are too many unknown factors. You simply have to do it first, and determine the "why" afterward.

How does one go about doing it? No man has ever travelled faster than sound, so how can any one know what happens at supersonic speeds? TELEMETERING TOP SECRET

The answer is "telemetering," one of the top-secret functions of scientists at the Naval Ordnance test station here. At this desert research centre are developed electronic gadgets called "telemeters" which are installed in high-speed missiles and tuned to send back to the ground by radio whatever information the scientists need.

But telemetering, important as it is in the development of new tools of war, is only one of the sciences called into play at Inyokern. It will occupy only a part of one wing of Inyokern's new \$7,500,000 laboratory, now in process of being equipped with \$4,000,000 worth of scientific apparatus, tools and instruments.

Other sections of the new lab will be devoted to explosives, ballistics, aerodynamics, chemistry, metallurgy, electronics, photography and optics.
