WAR WITH RUSSIA ---

for this condition could be placed on Russia. Yet he expressed the opinion that something was wrong with the amount of publicity being given to the differences between Russia and the Western Nations.

If war should come between Russia and the West, win or lose, it will be a disaster, declared the speaker, the world will be plunged back into the dark ages. "Any day we may expect to hear of the Greek revolutionary forces starting a full-scale offensive against the government," he said. The revolutionists, trained, perhaps officered by Russians might gain control of Greece. If such a thing did occur it would present a very nasty problem to the West, particularly to the United States which has extended aid to Greece as part of its plan to stop the spread of Communism, stated the speaker.

If United States meddles in affairs in Europe and other parts of the world it means the end of the Munro Doctrine, declared Major Scott. If United States interferes with affairs in Europe or the East it is foolish to assume the Americans will not be interfered with by any nation which feels it has the strength to extend its influence.

COURAGE AND GOODWILL NEEDED

School Student Cost \$91.50 Each

It cost the school district of Prince Rupert \$91.56 for the education of each student during the school year beginning August 1946 and ending June 1947. This figure was given out by the board secretary, Mrs. M. M. Roper, in the financial report read at the last meeting. The calculation was made on the basis of the June attendance of 1114. Total expenditure for the school district was \$154,291.93 which includes \$13,423.90, the school's share of the city debt. Deductible from the total expenditures are government grants amounting to \$52,285.92.

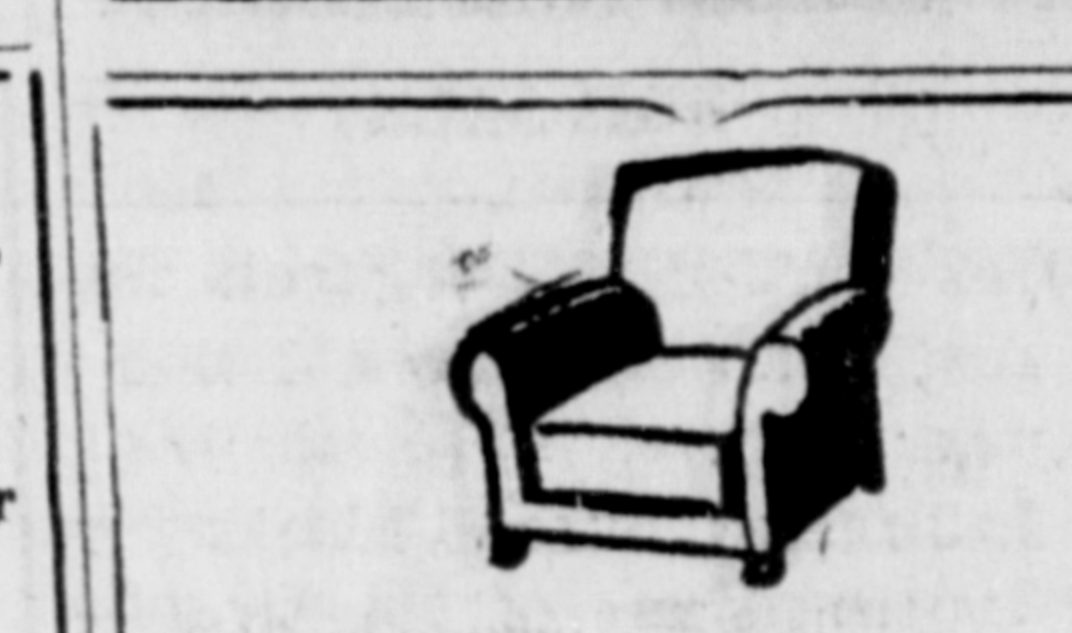

KE GIFTS TREASURY

of Donors, Large and Small, to Help in Reducing National Debt

NDON, (P)—Some give hundreds of thousands of pounds, some give pennies; a few give teeth that His Majesty's Government can sell for cash, others trying to reduce Britain's national debt.

John Dalton, Chancellor of Exchequer, watching over a national debt of \$28,000,000,000, receives these contributions with official thanks although the largest is insufficient to be noticeably the load on the taxpayer.

Dalton has given an annual amounting to two of the largest sums ever given the Treasury about \$2,000,000, presented by an anonymous donor in 1927, and \$257,000, presented in 1929 by Lord Theobald and his family in memory of his daughter, Miss Elsie MacKay, who disappeared when trying to fly the Atlantic in 1922.

The anonymous gift was used to establish a national fund, and its creation further contributions of \$267,496 have been received from various persons interested in Britain's welfare. The earnings on the original gift and additions brought the total, including investments, to \$45,063 in 1947.

The anonymous donor asked the gift be retained and accumulated until either alone with other funds it was sufficient to discharge the national debt, or the trustees may disburse the gift to meet national needs at any time they wished, provided a substantial sum was retained so that the gift may ultimately be utilized.

The Elsie MacKay Memorial fund must be accumulated for at least 45 and no more than 50 years and then applied to the national debt. It has been doubted in value, estimated at \$527,808 in 1947, and \$393,908 in 1947, in contributions to reducing the national debt include outright gifts of furniture building property, jewelry, china, government bonds which the recipients contribute to the fund, and—some suggested by officials—teeth with some value.

In 1930, Edward S. Harkness, a United States citizen, gave the treasury an outright gift of \$2,000 as a token of admiration. When Britain encountered financial difficulties in 1931, King George VI gave up \$50,000 of his own savings, the national expenditure by that amount.
