FUNERAL OF RONALD COLE

TERrace—The funeral service of the late Ronald Cole, victim of a sawmill accident last Friday, was held on Sunday afternoon at St. Matthew's Anglican Church with Rev. Roland Hills, assisted by the Rev. V. G. Graham, officiating. The church was filled at an early hour and the many beautiful wreaths and flowers showed the great esteem in which the deceased was held by his many Terrace friends. Company officials and fellow workers of the Little, Haugland and Kerr lumber mill gathered at the church and cemetery to pay their last respects.

The hymns "What a Friend we have in Jesus" and "Abide With Me" were sung with Mrs. C. J. Norrington as organist.

The casket was borne from the church to the hearse between a guard of honor of members of the Orange Lodge who also conducted the service at the Kalum Cemetery where interment took place.

Chief mourners were: Mrs. Ronald Cole (widow), Mr. Edgar Cole, Miss Dorothy Cole, and Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Lever.

STEWART NEWS Latest from Portland Canal Mining Centre

IS KILLED BY CEMENT SLAB

STEWART—The collapse of the concrete wall of a septic tank was the cause of the death of Cyril Roy Dickson, aged 65, on Friday last in the garden of his home on Vancouver Street here. The deceased, a carpenter by trade, was excavating in order to lower the septic tank in the garden adjoining his home, when one of the walls collapsed, crushing him.

Deceased's brother, Walter, discovered the body when he went out to see how the work was progressing. He summoned help from some of the neighbors and it took five men to move the slab so that the body could be extricated. Police Constable George Neilson was summoned and he, together with Coroner W. Shields Orr, visited the scene of the accident.

Dr. W. Roy Walker of Premier conducted a post-mortem examination of the body which revealed several fractured ribs, one of which had pierced the heart, and that death must have been instantaneous. He was working alone at the time of the accident.

Mr. Dickson is survived by a sister, Miss Mary Dickson, a brother, Walter, who resided with him here, another brother Warren of Ottawa and a sister Mrs. J. C. Long of Williams Lake.

The funeral took place here yesterday from the Roman Catholic Church of which the deceased was an adherent. Undertaker H. A. Stewart had charge and interment was in the Stewart Cemetery.

Winter Closes Stewart Mines

Big Four and Silver Tip—Morris Summit Carries on

STEWART—Operations on the Big Four have ceased for the winter. A watchman will remain on the property until the resumption of work in the spring of 1948. Twenty tons of ore were shipped recently to the smelter and is reported to have been of a very good grade. One of the late discoveries on the property gave assays of 1793 ounces of silver and another of over 200 ounces. Altogether the prospects for this property would seem very favorable.

It is the intention to resume work shortly on the Stewart Canal Mines which adjoins the Big Four on the northwest, according to John Haahti who has a large interest in the property.

With the advent of winter, work has discontinued on the Silver Tip Mine in the upper Salmon River area. The crew arrived in town during the past week. George Winkler, managing director of the company, is very enthusiastic about the future of the property. Discoveries during the summer would seem to warrant an optimistic view of the operation.

Work on the Morris Summit is proceeding apace and according to plan. A spirit of optimism seems to pervade the company from the management down to the humblest employee.

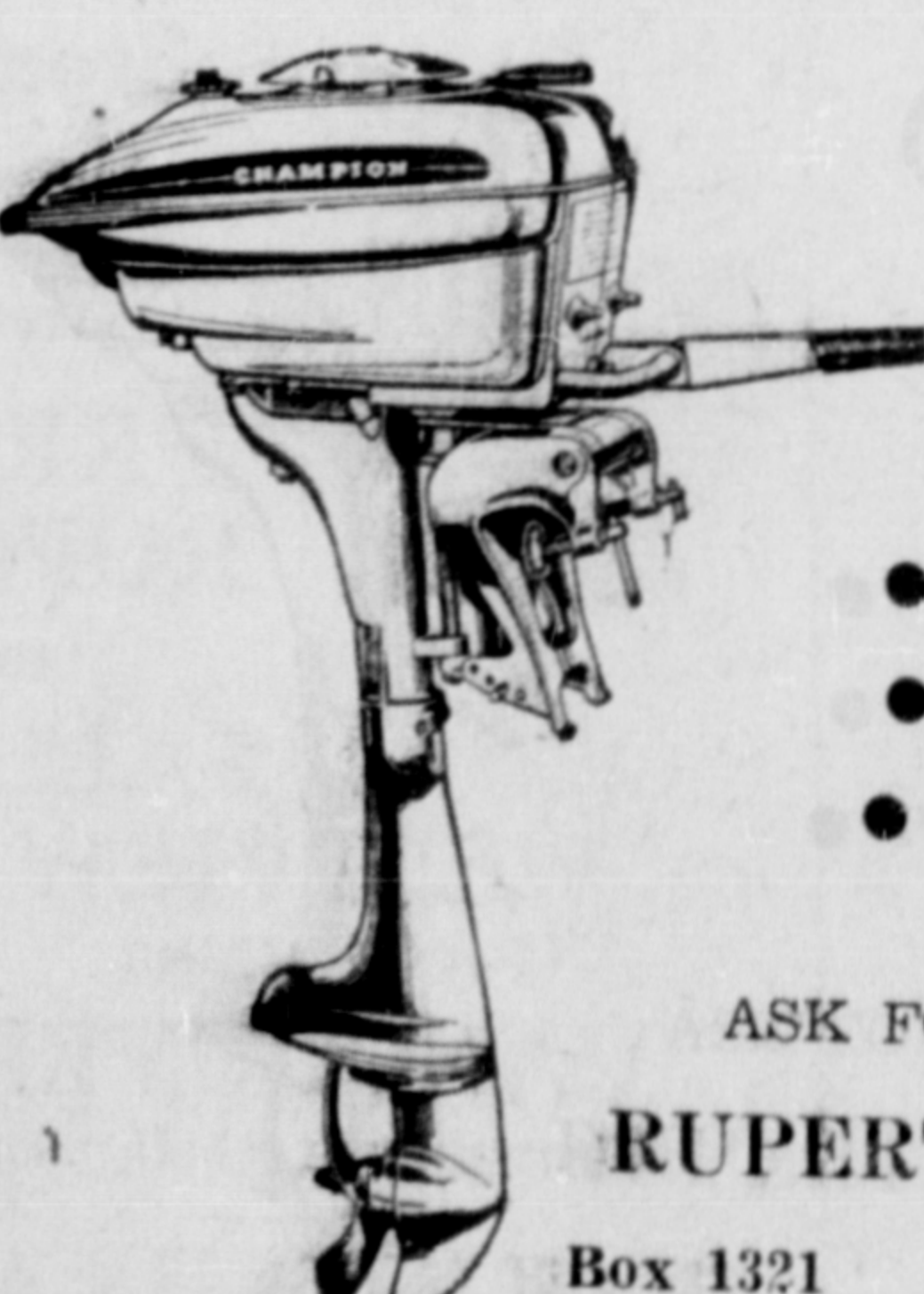
