Marriage Failure

ON THE EVIDENCE, American marriage is a monumental failure, declares David L. Cohn. in The Reader's Digest for November. The casualties of American marriages are higher than those of our wars; two marriages in five now end in divorce and the trend is still upward. Marriage has been made almost meaningless by many who marry with the reservation that they will get rid of it ifthey don't like it.

Cohn's article, condensed from The Atlantic Monthly, examines American attitudes which, he believes, are largely responsible for the high divorce rate. We teach our young that to be married is to be automatically happy, but we reject the "austere truth" that every blessing has its price. Marriage is looked upon either as a relationship to be broken at will or as a finality. In the first case we do not take it seriously. In the second we see it falsely, for marriage is not a finality, Cohn contends, but a beginning. "Girls are brought up to look forward to marrying; then they may relax. Men marry to 'settle down.' But if marriage is to thrive it must be constantly renewed."

Holding that the "emotional and intellectual adolescence" of Americans helps to destroy marriage, Cohn states that the United States is the only country where the husband is not-and does not want to be-a man, but a boy. "He wants to be mothered, not wived. Perhaps that is why he so often calls his wife 'Mama," his daughter 'Sister,' and his son 'Brother.' . . . In the first year his wife finds it pleasant to mother her boyish husband. But when children come she can better discharge her maternal impulses through them. Then babying her husband becomes tiresome and she yearns to live with a man."


