

Speedy Air Mail Service

MITH THE INSTITUTION of air mail service VV between Prince Rupert and Vancouver this week, it is satisfactory to be assured by the Post Office that there will be a prompt and speedy dispatch and delivery of the mails in connection therewith. Mail will close about an hour before the plane leaves each week-day at noon and will be sorted into the boxes immediately following its arrival in late afternoon.

Meantime, it is to be hoped that postal authorities may see fit to take the necessary steps to bring about an early resumption of the good general postal delivery service to which we were so used and which, evidently through a recent cutting of staff, has become somewhat impaired. Representations with this end in view have already been made. There is no intention whatever of being critical of the overworked and courteous postal staff. As

The very fact that it is monopolistic implies for it an even greater responsibility to the public than private enterprise which must either automatically expand or go out of business.

TOO MANY PARTIES



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
