GYRO PRINCESS LEADING AS FIRST PORT QUEEN RETURNS ARE MADE

An acceleration in the "vote" returns in the Port Queen contest is expected in the next three weeks as the four-way campaign swings into its final three weeks after almost a month of initial relative inactivity. Closing date for vote-bearing tickets is August 20, the night before Port Day.

First substantial returns of the campaign were reported today by Rup-Rec director Neil Ross and show Gyro Candidate Betty Pullen leading. However, only 48,000 votes—48 books of tickets—have been turned in for all candidates.

Here are the standings as of today:

Betty Pullen (Gyro) 16,000.
Barbara Wilson (Kinsmen) 13,000.
Lorraine Youngman (Junior Chamber) 11,000.
Ruth Jerstad (Sons of Norway) 8,000.

However, campaign managers for all four candidates are highly optimistic and airily discount

any anticipations of victory on the part of the others. Hints of dark strategy are being dropped in an offhand manner to confuse the opposition.

It is expected that the Civic Centre carnival committee will post a weekly prize for the candidate showing the largest returns between August 1 and the close of the campaign on August 20.

The Experts Say - -

WARM WEATHER APPETITES

Warm temperatures and lack-lustful appetites too often go together. But sultry weather or hot—any up-to-date housewife will still keep appetite and nutrition at a healthful level if she'll just mind her salads.

There's variety in these crisp concoctions which may be made from meat, or fish, vegetables, or fruit. And there's plenty of scope for the artistic cook to turn out a dish as delightful to look at as it is good to eat.

Cottage Salad: Two cups cooked meat; two cups diced cooked potatoes; one cup sliced cooked carrots; three hard-boiled eggs; cooked dressing; lettuce; three gherkins; one cup diced celery.

Mix the meat with sufficient dressing to moist. Pack in a cold mold and chill. Thoroughly chill cooked potatoes and carrots. Let diced celery stand in cold water to which a little lemon juice has been added. When ready to serve, line salad dish with lettuce, unmold the meat in the centre and arrange potatoes around potatoes, then the celery, drained and wiped dry. Chop whites of the eggs and sprinkle over the salad. Press yolks through a fine sieve and scatter over the meat. Garnish with halves of small gherkins and four cooked dressing over the vegetables.

BOILED DRESSING

Here is a recipe for boiled dressing which would go well with the above salad; one teaspoon salt; 1½ teaspoon mustard; two tablespoons sugar; two tablespoons flour; one egg; one cup milk, water, or buttermilk; two tablespoons shortening; ½ cup vinegar (cider).

Mix dry ingredients in upper part of double boiler. Add beaten egg and milk or water. Add vinegar, cook over boiling water, stirring constantly until thick. Remove from heat, add salt, strain. As needed, add milk.

FRUIT SALAD

Half-main course, half-dessert—that's the value of this salad.

One cup stiff mayonnaise; two cups stiffly whipped

cream; one teaspoon gelatine dissolved in two tablespoons boiling water; three cups chopped fruit such as canteloupe, cherries, bananas or peaches.

Mix whipped cream with the mayonnaise and add the gelatine and fruit. Place in a mould and put in freezing compartment of refrigerator long enough to become firm. Unmold, serve on crisp lettuce leaves with mayonnaise or fruit dressing.

And here's a boiled fruit dressing which would go well with the above salad—two egg yolks; three tablespoons sugar; one-quarter teaspoon mustard; pinch of salt; two tablespoons vinegar; five tablespoons cream. Mix the first five ingredients thoroughly, cook in a double boiler, partly cool and add whipped cream. This quantity serves 12.

TINKLE OF ICE

The tinkle of ice in a glass is the most delightful sound on a hot summer afternoon—and why not see that the glass is filled with Fruit Punch; two lemons, one-half grapefruit, one cup cherry, raspberry or other fruit juice, four cups of water, sugar to taste.
