

PRINCE RUPERT YEARS AGO

July 25, 1922

Major J. A. Motherwell, chief inspector of fisheries, predicted that the salmon season would be better than the 1921 season. He was in the city in the course of his annual inspection tour of district two.

Dr. P. T. Waterman, anthropologist for the Smithsonian Institute, Washington, on a tour of British Columbia and Alaska, declared that Indian totem poles were as beautiful and interesting as the Parthenon of Greece. He made a specialty of studying totems for the institute.

The local branch of the Great War Veterans Association planned to take an active part in a reception for Lord Byng of Vimy who was to visit the city in August. A parade, to include all association members was to be organized.

BACKGROUND OF TOTEM IS EXPLAINED

The mystery of how a totem pole bearing the floral crest of the Firewood clan of Indians, which originated on the Skeena River, should have been brought to Prince Rupert from the Queen Charlotte Islands where, presumably, no clan ever had the firewood crest, has been solved by Charles Dugoward, whose knowledge of his people's backgrounds has been aided by the work of Dr. Marius Barbeau, Dominion anthropologist.

Mr. Dugoward's explanation was inspired by a feature column in the Daily News of July 23 in which the columnist, "M. E. Anderer," told of the attraction which the floral carved pole had for tourists, and his own perplexity as to how the pole could have originated on the Queen Charlottes.

Quoting a work by Dr. Barbeau called "A True History of the Fireweed Phratry," part of a series of anthropological studies of totem poles of the north coast and interior Indians, Mr. Dugoward has the following to say:

"The Sky clan is one of the most important among the Gitksan, Tsimpsaan and Nishga tribes. It is also represented among the Haidas of the Queen Charlotte Islands and the two Athapascan groups, the Babine and Hagwilget, of the interior plateau. "Its origin is traced back to Temlaham on the Skeena, and its remote ancestress was Gow-ough, the virgin whom Rays-of-the-Sun, a sky spirit, once took to wife, in mythical times. Its members among the Gitksan fall into three or four groups or sub-clans and their differences are marked. They consider each other as belonging to wholly different clans. The Gitksan families that belong to the Sky clan proper are: Gurhsan and Hanamug, of Gileegykla (Kitsegukla); Gitludahl, Nurhs and Wawsemiarhae, of Kispayaks (Kisplox); Hatlsran and Aret of Gitenmaks (Hazelton); Weedelal of Gitsmglem (Kitsumkalum) and Tpee, of the Haidas (Queen Charlotte Islands). "Thus is established the Sky

clan connection of the Haida people with the same mainland clan and offers explanation why the Fireweed crest was used on the Haida totem pole which found its way to a Prince Rupert park.

Incidentally, according to Dr. Barbeau, several "Royal" families among the Tsimpsaan, including some on the Naas River and Porcher Island, claim Gow-ough as their tribal ancestress.

The Gitkeemele clan traces its origin to the mythical village of Keemela on the Naas River and its ancestress also bore the name of Gow-ough. Her supernatural experiences were the same, as for the Sky clan related previously.

The "Royal" Tsimpsaan families, known as Giseewudwada, include the Wee-salks and Niswars of the mainland, and the Teshbasas, of Kitkatla. Also the Harasu and Gyaedem-Skan-ees of the Hagwilget tribe on the upper Skeena are members of the clan.

Crests of the Sky clan are Thunderbird (Golden Eagle) Fireweed, Grizzly Bear, Blackfish and Rainbow.
