Beecher, S. A. Kirby, L. McLaren, Geoffrey W. Warner, Omer Levesque, C. and J. Chretien were honorary pall bearers.

Following the church service, a luncheon was made at the cemetery at Kalum where, on a eminence overlooking the mouth of the Kalum and Kenna Rivers, deceased's last resting place is circled by the mountains he had loved.

PILGRIMAGE OF PIONEERS

Vanderhoof Old Timers
Revisit Bobtail Lake

VANDERHOOF—W. J. (Bill) McAllan came into the Vanderhoof area long before there was a railway and long before Vanderhoof was sketched on a drafting board. Fort Fraser was the trading centre of a large district then when the chief modes of travel were by foot, by mule or by horse. Bill McAllan came in in 1906 to work for the Yukon Telegraph and was assigned to a post at Bobtail Lake or as it is shown on the maps Naltesby Lake.

Sunday Mr. McAllan returned to Bobtail Lake. He was accompanied by two other pioneers of this district—Mr. Turnbull, manager of the Hudson's Bay Farm at Fraser Lake in the early days, and George Snell, who came to the district in 1909 to become Vanderhoof's first farmer.

Most of the trip was over the route of the original telegraph trail and for a small truck the pilgrims found the going tough. At Bobtail Lake they saw the remains of the old telegraph cabin while nearby they saw the handiwork of a modern pioneer and his wife who operate a ranch that includes minks, goats, sheep and an admirable garden. Before returning to Vanderhoof, Mr. McAllan, who is in his eightieth year, hiked about ten miles and climbed to the top of Bobtail Mountain which has an altitude of 4695 feet.

Mr. McAllan, whose home is now in Victoria, and Mr. Turnbull, who resides in Vernon, motored up from the south to visit old friends and scenes in the district.

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CONVENTION OF FARMERS

VANDERHOOF—Delegates representing nine Farmers' Institutes in District C, and thirteen Women's Institutes in the Central British Columbia district held their final meetings of the two day convention last week.

Motions dealing with school taxes, noxious weeds, land breaking equipment, predatory animals and completion of McBride-Jasper Highway were passed by delegates. School taxes were a subject of interest to both men and women but from there on the motions took different directions. The ladies made it clear they were against daylight saving time but they gave a "yes" to the motion calling for rural electrification throughout the district. Travelling dental clinics for rural areas, better treatment for pensioners and a home for the aged at Prince George were also asked for by the delegates.

Mrs. Stella Gummow, Victoria superintendent of the Women's Institutes of British Columbia, gave a report on the federal convention held in Halifax and described what took place at the fiftieth anniversary held at Guelph earlier in the year.

W. L. Johnson, superintendent of the Farmers' Institute of British Columbia, Dean Clement of the U.B.C. and Sam Crocker of Vanderhoof were guest speakers during sessions of the Farmers' Institute.

Social activities included a luncheon Thursday with the ladies of the North Side Institute acting as hostess at the Prairiedale hall.

Men of the local Farmers' Institute were hosts to the delegates at a supper held in the Vanderhoof Hotel the same day. H. M. Blackburn of Prince George Farmers' Institute, president for District C, acted as chairman.

Delegates were welcomed to Vanderhoof by Mr. Wallace representing the Board of Trade, while John Andros, president of the local Farmers' Institute, and Mrs. A. Nicholson extended greetings on behalf of their respective groups.
