

- 2. A flared shade provides far more reading light than a straight, narrow one.
- 3. White or pastel shade linings afford more light than darkcoloured materials.
- 4. Light should be placed so that everyone is served to the best advantage.
- 5. There should be no dark shadows or corners in rooms where people read.
- 6. An unshaded lamp causes glare, reducing ability to see or read properly.
- 7. Bulbs of adequate strength should be used in all sockets.
- 8. Light should fall over opposite shoulder to writing side.
