Heavy Tax Cuts Due?

Another Sizable Surplus Is Looming at Ottawa

OTTAWA (CP) -With a new session of Parliament opening Dec. 5, and with the Federal treasury showing signs of windconfer- ing up the fiscal year with a on e charged the sizable surplus, heavy tax redisseminating "bra- ductions are being predicted in unoffical circles.

The surplus for the first nine months of the current fiscal year lose to \$500,000,000. The last cal year ended with a surplus

However, the more cautious of this year's surplus will not be as last year's. For instance, the government will have to pay ou some \$95,000,000 in income tax refunds before the end of March.

As well, payments to the provinces under provincial taxation agreements and reductions in taxes granted in the last budget will not really make themselves felt until the latter part of the year.

The more optimistic of the observers predict a surplus that will surpass last year's by at least \$200,000,000.

Enthusiastic Anticipation Pervades Air

Final Rehearsal Todav-Abbey Is Sealed and Guarded

LONDON (CP) - Last day before the eagerly awaited wedding of Princess Elizabeth and Lieut. Philip Mountbatten dawned murkily today with a chilling rain falling on a grey London. However, unsettled weather could not dim the enthusiasm of workmen putting the final touches on street decorations and Westminster adornments or daunt the determination of many hundreds of thousands to see just as much of the great day's happenings as they possibly can.

The key event fo rthe wedding eve was a rehearsal at 5 p.m.—complete in all details down to the wedding ring of beaten Welsh gold. The King, Elizabeth, Philip and the wedding attendants all took part along with the Archbishops of Canterbury and York and other ecclesiastical dignatories assisting in the performance of the

Westminster Abbey is already closed to the public and, after the rehearsals, was "sealed" by Scotland Yard with all-night guards posted. The guards were doubled today in all Whitehall offices, scrutinizing with the utmost thoroughness all who enter — casual visitors, government officials, civil servants and

Princess Elizabeth attended a tea party at St. James Palace this afternoon and showed five rooms of wedding gifts to the visitors. The Princess had no further engagements for to-
