WASHINGTON, @ -- Former Congressman Andrew J. May was convicted today of selling his influence while warting chairman of the House of Representative military committee.

The jury also convicted the makers of munitions, Henry and Murray Garson, of paying the 72-year old former Kentucky congressman more than \$50,000 in bribes for favors during the war years.

The defendents received the verdicts calmly.
