

NO WORD ON PICKETING OF MEAT SHOPS

Whether or not Prince Rupert's butcher shops will be picketed on Wednesday by union members sympathetic to the striking United Packinghouse Workers remained in doubt today as heads of local unions declared that they had no information regarding the proposed move to picket packing plants, railroads and butcher shops on a province-wide basis.

William Symington, international representative of the Packinghouse Workers Union (CIO), said in Vancouver Monday that every source of fresh meat would be cut off by a picketing plan scheduled to go into operation Wednesday.

Up until Monday afternoon no information on the plan had been received at Prince Rupert and union heads here said that they did not know what plan of action would be taken if a request to picket local shops were to be made by the union headquarters in Vancouver.

J. S. Black, business agent for the Carpenters' Union, said that, if such a request were made, it would come to the Prince Rupert Trades and Labor Council from the Trades and Labor Council of Vancouver but that, as far as he knew,

no such request had been made. "I doubt if we would consider such action unless a definite request is received," he said. "There is no sense in going off half-cocked about these things."

Stan Boshier, secretary of the United Fishermen and Allied Workers' Union, who has been acting as local contact man with the Packing House Workers, said he had no specific information from Mr. Symington.

"I wrote Mr. Symington, airmail, regarding action here," he said, "but until I get a reply we won't know whether or not they want to include Prince Rupert in the picketing."

Prince Rupert's meat supply, which normally comes from packing houses in Alberta, is now originating in the central interior, where livestock is being butchered on farms and in small slaughter houses and trucked to the city. So far it has been adequate.

Two weeks ago the local branch of one of the major packing houses received a shipment of livestock which was slaughtered here but this practice was discontinued when the union advised that such meat was considered "hot."

No protest has been made about arrivals of beef slaughtered in the interior.

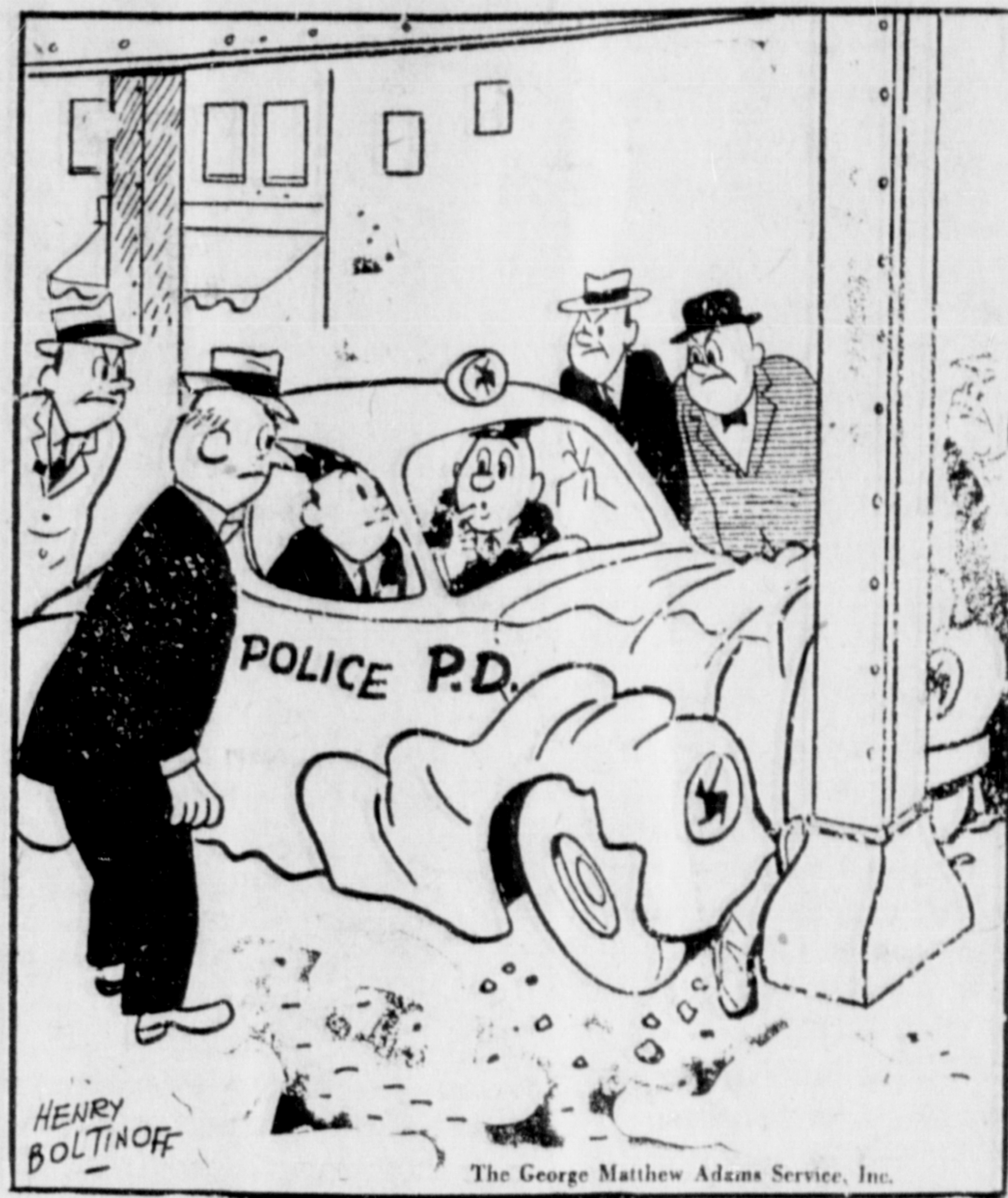
Shipping of Grain Here

Grain committee of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce is to go into action immediately with a view to bringing about movement of 1948 crop grain through the local elevator. The matter was brought up at the regular monthly meeting of the chamber last night by Ald. Robert McKay who stressed the importance of early action if the local grain plant is to be put to use. Co-operation of the Associated Boards of Trade will be sought, the subject of grain shipment over the local railway and through this port having been initiated at the recent Associated Boards convention here.

NOT SATISFIED WITH HIGHWAY

Speaking re highways, Mr. McKay pointed out that crews still come in and out every working day instead of living on the job. He suggested that this matter be taken up with the department.

Letters on Skeena Highway publicity were spoken to by the president and discussed. In the discussion it was pointed out that oil companies' maps and tables of distances are not all showing Prince Rupert or have various inaccuracies. The secretary was instructed to take up this with local managers of oil companies.

Vote of appreciation to the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation and local station CFPR for the broadcasting of the World Series baseball was passed, coupled with the hope of similar broadcasts such as that of the National League hockey to follow.

The meeting expressed appreciation of the action of War Assets Corporation in permitting friends of ingoing and outgoing air passengers at the Seal Cove air base to enter the gates as planes are arriving and departing and assured co-operation of seeing that there is no abuse of the privilege as far as property in the base is concerned.

HOW CAN I ???

Q. How can I remodel a straw hat?

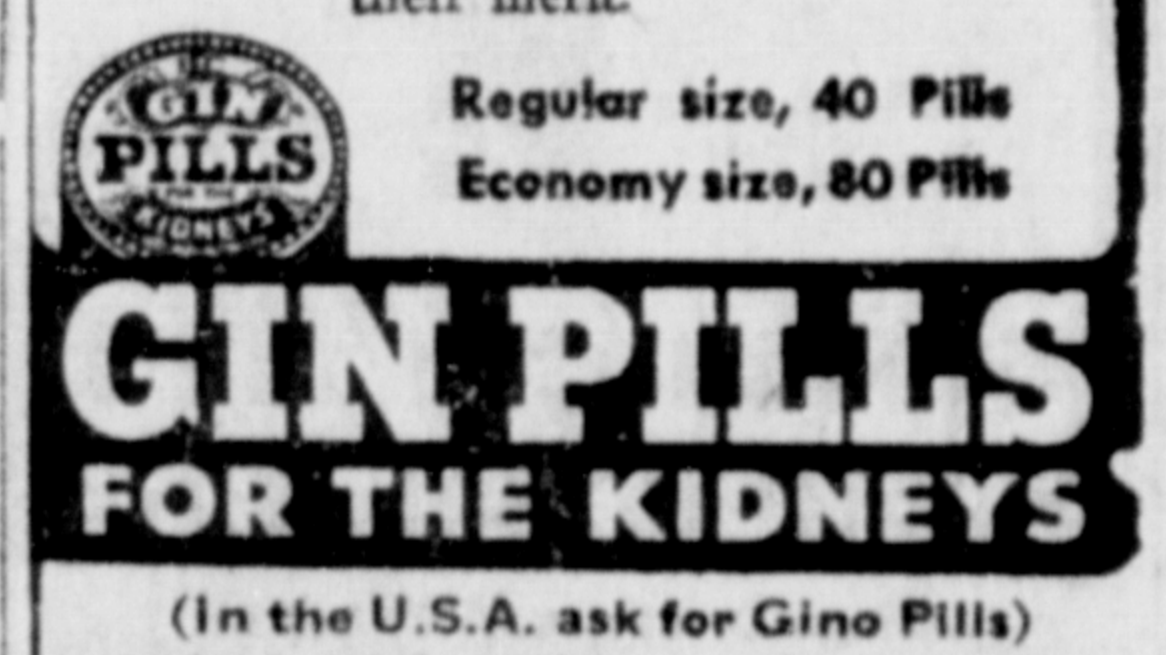
