CARE WITH CAMP FIRES—With last year's forest fire damage and firefighting costs in Canada totalling \$2,722,652 and more than a million acres of forest ruined by fire, the various provincial Lands and Forestry Departments are doing everything in their power this year to eliminate such waste and destruction during the danger months of July, August and September, when dry woodlands and heavy winds create serious fire threats. Most fires are caused by carelessness by camp fire enthusiasts and, in the above pictures two experienced guides are seen applying some of the dos and don'ts in making a camp fire. (1) A good open spot near water should be selected, thoroughly cleared of brush and soaked well before fire is built. Make a circle of rocks for the fire bed and, when possible, use dry pine. It splits easily into kindling and doesn't throw off sparks. Don't use dry hemlock, cedar or balsam. (2) A long pole dug into the ground at a sharp angle and supported by a vertical crotch makes an excellent and sturdy "tea-pole." The pail of tea can be slid down the pole and poured minus any burned fingers. (3) Most important step of all is thoroughly extinguishing fire by splashing area with plenty of water. The soil underneath should be scraped to make sure there are no burning embers left.
