SECOND GAME IS ALSO TIE

Sons of England and Great War Veterans played to Draw For Gihuly Cup

The first two games of the Gihuly Cup football ties have been played but no eliminations have yet been made for the second game between the Great War Veterans and the Sons of England last night like the first earlier in the week between the Callies and Sons of Canada, was a draw. Last night's match resulted in a score of 2 all and, while the brand of play was not up to that displayed in the first game, the proceedings were interesting and were watched by a good crowd of spectators. Playing on the down grade, the Vets scored both their goals in the first half and, with the change in the positions in the second half, the Englishmen got their equalizers though it was not until the last ten minutes that they scored. From the outset, it looked like a win for the ex-soldiers and the wind-up was a climactic one. Both teams missed scoring chances and play was ragged in spots but the score was fairly representative of their respective merits. The Sons fielded only ten men.

Tom Jones refereed and A. Clapperton and J. Harris officiated on the side lines.

Play and Scoring
Responsible for the scores of the Vets were J. Johnson who tricked the English backs and put the sphere through the posts out of the reach of the goalie and F. Russell whose shot was accidentally headed in by Bales, one of the Sons of England full backs. The Vets had most of the play in the first half.

The Sons of England pressed in the second half but, missing several good chances, seemed unable to score until Tinker and Dickens in quick succession, just before the close, tied up the score. The Vets also missed chances in the second half.

Both goal keepers played well. The work of W. Murray, centre half for the Veterans, and Dick Howe, full back for the Sons of England, was outstanding.
