NEITHER TEAM SCORED IN FOOTBALL AT ANYOX

Final Game Has Yet to be Played on Return of Players From Prince Rupert

ANYOX, Sept. 10. — Football has been of a very high order in Anyox during the season of 1924, and some excellent games have been played. In the finals for the cup, the Beach and the Smelter had to play two games for a decision, the Beach getting the trophy on the second attempt by a one goal margin. The series for the medals has still to be decided. In the first half of the season the Mine was the leading team and was looked upon to win the second half, but the Smelter beat them to it, which necessitated a play-off, both teams agreeing to a sudden death game. This game resulted in a tie, and a game for a decision was set for Sunday night last and played. Neither team could score, however, and another game will have to be played on the return of the pig-skin chasers from Prince Rupert.

Three teams are entered in the Fair Board's annual native football competition for the cup now held by Port Simpson. These teams are Port Simpson, Y.P.E.A., Old Massett and Kitkalla. The opening game is scheduled to take place on Thursday afternoon between Port Simpson and Old Massett.

Two teams are entered in the baseball competition for the \$45 cash prize. They are Port Simpson and Greenville who were scheduled to play this afternoon. Dates of further native football games will be announced later.

ANYOX REGRETS NOT SENDING BALL TEAM

ANYOX, Sept. 10. — Owing to the departure of several representative ball players for Vancouver several days ago, the games partially arranged to be played at Prince Rupert during Fair Week, had to be cancelled by Anyox, which was greatly to be regretted, as it was hoped to be well represented both in baseball and football.

Baseball has taken a strong hold in Japan and, in the playing of the game, certain customs have been adopted many of which might well be emulated in this country. The Japanese play the game conservatively, dislike taking long chances and abhor wild base running. Fans are very loyal but they are considerate of the feelings of others and "razzing" is an unpardonable sin. Pitchers have a habit of uttering a war cry as they deliver the ball. The Japs are very lavish in their prizes which include all kinds of merchandise, silverware, jewelry and clothing.

One of the biggest American military reunions since the Great War will take place at Wilbur Wright Field, Dayton, Ohio, where the International Air Races are to be held on October 2, 3 and 4. Flyers and officers from the United States Army Air Service in all parts of the country will be permitted to attend. There will be twelve aerial racing events for which \$50,000 in prizes have been offered. Many aviators who flew together over the German lines during the Great War will enter the competitions.
