abroad. Coming back after an absence of seven months, he had noticed a great improvement in the city streets brought about by the policy of the city in replacing the old plank roads with graded streets. There was nothing that caused more impression on transient visitors than the appearance of the streets and the members of the city council were to be congratulated on the improvements that had been made. Stating that the British Empire Exhibition which he had visited was a colossal and magnificent affair in which the Dominion of Canada occupied a prominent position, Mr. Stork declared that the annual exhibition in Prince Rupert was no less a credit to the city and district. The quality of the exhibits here compared favorably with those to be found anywhere in the world. Only in bulk but not in taste of arrangement was the Prince Rupert Exhibition excelled by those of Toronto and London.

**Matter of Satisfaction**  
"It is a matter of great satisfaction to me to see the development of this northern country and the city of Prince Rupert," continued Mr. Stork. "Thanks are due to the committee that have kept this organization aloft and to those persons who year after year have given freely of the energy in that direction. It gives me the greatest pleasure imaginable to participate in the 1924 Prince Rupert Exhibition which I now proclaim formally opened to the public. May it long continue to prosper."  
The Kitimaat Band then played "O Canada," while the gathering stood at attention and the Prince Rupert Exhibition was once again launched with enthusiasm and every promise of great success.

## FUR MARKET IN THE CITY

William Goldbloom Plans Establishing Auction Sale Here For Pelts

In an endeavor to establish a fur auction sale centre in Prince Rupert, on the same basis as the fur auction sales in eastern Canada, in order that fur buyers in the east can come to the city to trade in furs and thus furnish a more convenient market for the trappers of northern British Columbia, William Goldbloom, one of the largest fur traders in the province will shortly journey to eastern Canada and the United States to interest the large fur buyers.

**Logical Market**  
Mr. Goldbloom claims that as Prince Rupert is the centre of one of the largest raw fur producing territories in the Dominion, producing annually thousands of dollars worth of raw furs it would be to the direct advantage of fur traders and trappers to have a market right at their door in order that they may obtain and sell raw furs to the best advantage. The establishing of such a fur auction market would mean that the trappers could send their furs to the local merchants or fur dealers with the full knowledge that they were getting the highest market price for their goods. Mr. Goldbloom claims that in this way a lot of money that is now finding its way east would be distributed among local dealers and would be a big help to local business during the quiet winter months. On his annual trips to the east Mr. Goldbloom has always advocated establishing this business in Prince Rupert and the fur buyers have expressed their willingness to instal a representative on the coast to attend the sales provided sufficient fur was on hand to make it worth their while to come west.

**Present Method Bad**  
As the business is handled now Mr. Goldbloom claims the trapper is shipping valuable furs east, where prices are continually changing to the detriment of the shipper, and in addition the trapper is obliged to wait a
