ALLAN BROOKS VISITS CITY

Famous Naturalist and Artist
Passed Through Yesterday
After Summer in Atlin

TALKS ABOUT BIRDS

Says Balance of Nature is Myth
and Tells of Ruthless Destruction in North

That the so-called "balance of nature," which some people are afraid to disturb, is all a myth and does not exist in fact is the conclusion arrived at by Major Allan Brooks, the famous naturalist and artist who was here yesterday on his way back from a four months visit to Atlin where he had been studying the birds and mammals. He illustrates this from his recent visit into the Canadian north where he found the country dominated by red squirrels and whiskey jacks. He says that at least eighty per cent of the eggs laid by the birds up there are taken by the squirrels and jays. He found that on the islands in Atlin Lake, where there are no squirrels or jays, birds were numerous and the young were all hatched. On the country surrounding the lake, which is infested by squirrels, there were three colonies of waxwings, birds which always nest in colonies, but not a young bird was found. They had all been destroyed young or else the eggs taken by the squirrels and whiskey jacks.

Brows a Pest

Leaving everything to nature does not meet with the approval of the major. He says the crow is a pest everywhere and destroys an immense number of birds' eggs and young birds. This was particularly true on the islands where the seagulls breed. The crows there destroy more eggs than ever the Indians did.

Major Brooks says a book has recently been published by a student of nature, Miss Althea Sherman, which shows conclusively that nature does not balance things up correctly and it is up to man, wherever possible to help adjust matters.

Birds are usually plentiful in or near a town because to a certain extent they are protected there and provided with food. An instance of the destructiveness of some birds is seen in the herring gull which eats the eggs and young of other seabirds with the result that wherever it nests the other birds are driven away. Gulls, guillemots, puffins and many other birds are the victims of the crow.

The major was very emphatic that he did not believe in the balance of nature and his studies had all tended to make him more pronounced in his views.

RATE TOO HIGH TO SHIP FLOUR THROUGH RUPERT TO POLAND

Joe Sigmund received an order from the Polish government for 20,000 barrels of flour and took steps to ascertain if it would be possible to make the shipment from the prairies via Prince Rupert. It was found, however, that the freight rate from Calgary to Prince Rupert was 20c per barrel higher than from Calgary to Vancouver making a total difference on the 20,000 barrels of \$4,000. Mr. Sigmund states that there is no flour mill in northern Alberta large enough to handle the order. The flour was to be for Polish relief this winter and was to reach there by December. It was proposed to ship it via the Panama Canal.

RULES PUBLISHED FOR USE OF AIRMEN

Keep to Right is Rule of Sky as Well as of Land: No Jay Flying

LONDON, Sept. 17. — Rules agreed on by the British, Belgian and Dutch governments to minimize risk of collision between aircraft, have been issued by the air ministry.

These provide that every pilot when flying on a compass course shall, whenever it is safe and practicable, fly on the right of the straight line adjoining the point of departure and point of arrival. When an aircraft is flying beneath cloud, it must keep at a fair distance below the cloud base in order to see and be seen.

When a pilot decides to follow a route which is officially recognized or consists of a line of ground marks, he must bear in mind that the risk of collision with another aircraft following the same route is considerable. Every pilot therefore following such a route shall endeavor to keep it at least 300 metres on his left.
