EFFECT OF ONTARIO LIQUOR PLEBISCITE ON UNITED STATES

U.S. Enforcement More Feasible Dry Agents Declare Owing to Decision

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25.—(By Canadian Press).—Unquestionably the result of the recent election in Ontario on the liquor question, wherein the drys won by a large majority, will have an important reaction in the United States. It has greatly encouraged the drys in this country and will tend to cause them to intensify their efforts to bring about strict enforcement of the prohibition laws here. Moreover, it will encourage the drys in the efforts they plan to make to lighten up the Volstead Act and other dry enactments and get Congress to pass new and stricter legislation.

As the dry leaders here look at it, had Ontario been lost by the drys the difficulties of preventing smuggling of liquor across the border and into the United States would have been much increased. But more important than this, the wets here would have been enabled, had Ontario gone wet, to have pointed to the fact that the dry movement has received a tremendous setback in Canada and it was symptomatic of what was coming in the United States.

As it is, the drys here are encouraged to demand that the border be guarded more and more closely. They hold that this must be done in justice to what they regard as public sentiment in this country and in Ontario. They hold that it is beginning to appear more and more feasible to bring about highly effective enforcement in the United States. They assert the Ontario result foreshadows a dry Canada. They have a vision of the closest co-operation between a dry United States and a dry Canada in putting the illicit seller of liquor out of business.

It might be thought that no more dry legislation was necessary in this country but, from the standpoint of the drys, more is essential. The coming winter and especially in the newly elected Congress, attempts will be made to increase the severity of the law. It is proposed to make the penalties more severe and sweeping at the seat of government in the District of Columbia and also to make them more severe in general. If the drys have their way, they will provide for heavy penalties against the person who buys liquor as well as the person who sells it.
