POISON WOLVES IN FAR NORTH

Many Destroyed and Pelts Secured During Past Season

OTTAWA, Jan. 11.—A further campaign of extermination against the wolves of the Barren lands has been decided upon by the North West Territories branch of the department of the interior. Last year a party of hunters under B. Loranger, a veteran of the Arctic—were employed in poisoning the wolves in the country north east of the Great Slave Lake, this operation proved entirely satisfactory, and it is to be repeated this year, on a larger scale.

Mr. Loranger's party travelled in their own schooner from Fort Smith to the Lockhart river country and once arrived built camps in the region of the caribou migration, and set out poison for the wolves, which prey on the deer. The hunters took in only one quarter of an ounce of poison but even with this small quantity, several hundred wolves were killed off, while there was practically no damage to the fur bearing animals.

In order to investigate the methods employed by the hunters, Corporal Schulz, R.C.M.P., of Fort Resolution, made a winter patrol into the Artillery lakes country, and found that the operations were being carried on in a manner satisfactory to the government.

The department has received definite proof as to the results achieved; and it is intended to prosecute this work until such time as the millions of caribou in the Barren Lands are safe from the attacks of the wolves which up to the present time have every year killed off large numbers of the deer.

CHECKING TRAFFIC DRUGS BY POLICE

Wholesalers Tracked by Police in Britain: Much Came From Germany

Drastic penalties and the activities of the police have reduced the traffic in cocaine to a considerable extent says the London Times. The police have been very successful in tracking down the big merchants who disposed secretly of the drug (much of it came from Germany) in wholesale quantities, and the smaller buyers and sellers whose markets was in shady resorts of the West-end of London and the large provincial cities.

The cocaine habit is quite a modern evil in this country continues the article. It was introduced during the war and spread rapidly. In those days it was as easy to buy cocaine as it was to buy a cup of coffee. The drug was cheap and plentiful. The army authorities and the police made the danger perfectly clear to the Government and a regulation was passed under the Defence of the Realm Act making it an offence punishable by imprisonment for six months to sell cocaine to any member of his Majesty's forces. Then it was discovered that the drug was being eagerly bought in large quantities not only by soldiers and sailors, but also by civilians both men and women, and the regulation was amended, making it an offence for any unlicensed person to buy or sell cocaine.
