

IS SUSPECTED Noice Says She Probably Allowed One Member of Wrangell Island Party to Starve

NEW YORK, Feb. 12. - Ada Blackjack, an Eskimo woman, sole survivor of the Arctic expedition under Alan Crawford, probably saved herself and refused aid to Lorne Knight, a member of the party, according to an interview with Harold Noice published in the World.

Noice led the rescue party that reached Wrangell Island only to find Knight dead, and Alan Crawford, Milton Gale and Frederick Muir missing. Ada Blackjack was rescued.

Early stories paid tribute to the heroism of this woman. Noice said these were based on her own. statements. Some entries in her diary hitherto undecipherable, Noice says, reveal that Ada refused to aid Knight as he lay dying and probably ate the food that would have saved Knight from
