

Coolidge has no Difficulty Beating Johnson in Contest for Presidential Nomination

(By Ben Deacon, Canadian Press Correspondent) NEW YORK, May 23 .- The race for the Republican presidential nomination has been run. All that remains is the posting of the winner. Despite thrilling forecasts, it proved a very tame affair. Calvin Coolidge won in a walk, his only active opponent, Senator Hiram Johnson, of California, being left hopelessly in the rear. The big Republican gathering at Cleveland next month will not be a convention, but a ratification meeting. It will merely endorse Goolidge's nomination.
