## BRINGING UP FATHER



### DIFFERENCES AT CITY COUNCIL DISCUSSING SALARY LIST LAST NIGHT DEVELOPED HEATED DEBATE.

deserved and he saw no reason why one man should be singled out. He referred to the salary of \$135 being offered an assistant engineer. This, in view of services given, he felt would be inadequate.

Ald. Collart did not consider the proposal a raise in the salary of the city engineer, but simply a matter of giving him what he had been promised in view of the fact that he had proven up to his responsibilities. The superintendent of utilities had been given his full salary when he had been engaged, for his capabilities were known. It had been a different matter with the city engineer. As far as the engineer's assistant was concerned his duties were simply as a clerk and his salary had been set accordingly.

#### Unseen Power

Referring to a conference with a tarvin expert who had been in the city recently and with whom a conference had been held without the mayor being invited, Ald. Casey launched out with the charge that there was apparently an unseen power controlling the board of works and that the decisions arrived at were not made by the four members of the board.

"In my experience of city affairs," said Ald. Casey, "I have not before seen a committee chairman who had the audacity to call a meeting and, through malicious endeavor, allow the mayor not to be invited. There is some one controlling the Board of Works whose name is not upon its list of members."

A recommendation was made by the board that Mr. Crew be engaged as assistant at a salary of \$150. When that report comes to the council, however, the salary has been changed to \$135. You and I, Mr. Mayor, do not count and the rule of the board of works is without our power or consent. As far as I am concerned, I do not intend to waste further time with the Board of Works. I support the salary increase for the city engineer but, if it is passed, I intend to give notice of motion therupon that an increase of wages for laborers from 50¢ to 57 1/4¢ be given." Concluding his remarks, Ald. Casey launched the accusation of dictatorship against Ald. Collart.

Ald. Perry then rose to explain the matter of the conference with the tarvin expert. The city engineer had informed him (Ald. Perry) of this man's presence in the city and there had an informal conversation. "I would like you to know that I am just as honorable as Ald. Casey but I am not engaged in mud throwing tactics," declared Ald. Perry with some heat.

Ald. Macdonald asked, if a salary of \$150 had been decided upon for Mr. Crew, why it had been changed. Ald. Perry replied that his duties were to be

simply those of a clerk.

#### Insinuations

"Being somewhat new to the board, I do not know whether it is customary for certain members of the council to make such insinuations as these against others," said Ald. Macdonald. "When Ald. Casey makes such statements as these, I would like him to go a little farther and state by whom the Board of Works is governed. As far as I am concerned, I can say that no one has approached me to tell me what to do and I do not think anyone would dare to do so. It seems unfortunate to me that the city's business cannot be conducted along better lines than have been shown tonight. I hope that Ald. Casey will be able to give a satisfactory explanation of his charges."

Ald. Macdonald referred to his troubles in last year's council and said that he had also hoped for more harmony this year.

#### Outside Power

Ald. Casey said he held no suspicion against Ald. Macdonald but his ground was still that there was an outside power controlling the Board of Works. All matters pertaining to the Board of Works should be discussed by the Board of Works, he felt, and its recommendations should come before the city council. He stood to have the affairs of the Board of Works conducted openly and above board. He had no intention of making any suggestions against Ald. Macdonald.

Ald. Perry said it was not his practice to do things behind people's backs.

Ald. Macdonald referred to the fact that the city engineer was the highest paid official in most cities. Prince Rupert had an efficient engineer and if it was the desire to retain him he must be paid as high as the superintendent of utilities. Much work was contemplated this year and the city engineer would have in his hands the spending of much money.

At this point the report giving the city engineer the salary increase was adopted.

#### Crew Appointed

The report permanently adopting Mr. Crew as engineer's assistant brought forward an amendment from Ald. Collart that his title be clerk instead of assistant. There was no seconder. "What is the sense," asked Ald. Casey, "of using the man as an assistant engineer and not styling him as such?" Ald. Macdonald moved that the salary be \$150 and Ald. Casey seconded. The amendment was lost, only the mover and seconder voting for it, and the motion carried.

The recommendation to transfer the records of the city engineer's department to the engineer's office was adopted without discussion.

#### Stenographers

With the bringing up of the report for \$5 increases for Miss Astori and Miss Kelsey, Ald. Macdonald said he was in sympathy with the individual cases.

Mrs. W. B. Penny and daughter arrived in the city from Thurston Harbor on the Prince John yesterday afternoon.

These employees had proved themselves but there were perhaps others who had been over-

looked. Mr. Allstone was the only old official who would now be left at the salary given him with last year's reorganization. Mr. Vickers last year had been given a ten dollar increase.

"Mr. Allstone is one of our best servants," continued Ald. Macdonald, "and he is still left at the same salary as last year. I think the finance committee might see its way clear to recognize the service he had rendered. He is doing most important work and he is doing it well."

Ald. Collart said he had nothing to say on the matter. Ald. Macdonald then moved that a \$10 increase be given Mr. Allstone. There was no seconder and the original motion carried.

#### Staff Reduction

The finance committee recommended the adoption of a report from the city treasurer to the effect that the services of W. H. Wilson-Murray could be eliminated after March 31, since the treasurer's office had been relieved of the work of the city engineer's department.

Ald. Casey expressed his understanding that the treasurer's department was not in a position for staff reduction. According to his information the work was not up to date and the auditor had been compelled to come in and push it along.

Ald. Collart said that the recommendation of the city treasurer, as head of his department, that he could get along with one man less was enough for him. The auditor would be done with the city books for the year within two weeks' time. Never before had they been ready before the end of April.

Ald. Casey insisted that he had reason to believe there was something wrong with the treasurer's department. The city engineer did not know where he was at with his books in the treasurer's department and for that reason had wanted to remove them.

#### Overtime

Ald. Macdonald referred to \$150 overtime being paid in January but was given a satisfactory explanation by Ald. Collart that it had involved extra work that could not be done in regular hours such as the conducting of the election, getting out of special local improvement assessment notices and opening a new set of books for the utilities department. As for Ald. Casey's statement that the city treasurer's books were behind, he had heard nothing of it.

Ald. Macdonald made the request that the report be laid over for discussion in private.

It was taken up again after adjournment but was laid over until tonight for further discussion, no satisfaction apparently having been reached.

At the close of the regular meeting, Ald. Casey offered his notice of motion for a rise in the labor scale from 50¢ to 57 1/4¢.
